s unfortunate as it is. racism and all its synonyms, continue to pop up from time to time to strain the relationship among citizens of cosmopolitan Trinidad and Tobago. The latest flare-up coming after the 2020 General Election betrays an underlying vein of racism that exposes itself during high emotional events. There is no place for racism here. Sadly, it shames us who heed the Psalmist injunction, "Behold how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity".

The late United States freedom-fighter Martin Luther King identified racism as one of the three evils in the world. The others being poverty and war. If we take the time to examine the effect of racism and bigotry on people, we will soon understand how dangerous they can be for humanity. It would be useful for

us to read of how racism affects human beings in other parts of the world to understand why we must condemn it and stamp it out completely.

The horror stories coming out of the slave trade and human trafficking, the holocaust and the apartheid system in South Africa should unite us against acts of racial discrimination. It was racial animosity that led to the 1994 genocide in Rwanda where 800,000 citizens were massacred in 100 days of civil terror. That was 26 years ago. And the fight against racism continues even today in the USA – the bastion of democracy.

In the aftermath of these tragic events the cry from right thinking people around the world was, "Never Again". Yet it happened again and again. Where have we failed? Leaning on the vision of our Lord Jesus Christ, the late South African anti-apartheid leader Nelson

Mandela offered this advice:

"No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must have learnt to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love. For love comes naturally from the heart than its opposite."

As a church involved in education, we would have the opportunity to make the case for values education at the proposed discussion on curriculum transformation in schools. We must embrace this opportunity to lead the change. If we are to have a safe, equitable and creative space we must develop a sense of right and wrong that is trustworthy and ethical. We do this within a framework that is not cold, lifeless nor legalistic, but with inspiration, compassion and understanding. It is up to all of us.

What does it take to get your undivided attention?



Many of us struggle all our lives to be good listeners

llow me to paint a word picture for you. You and I are standing outside, and you are sharing with me some very important thoughts you have had recently. In the middle of our conversation, I just turn and walk away, leaving you hanging mid-sentence. Even if I am

not quite that rude, I start looking around and with my body language I communicate that I am not the least bit interested in what you have to say.


If you are a normal person, you feel hurt and offended by my lack of respect for you. You have quickly seen that I am not a sincere listener.

Our children feel the same way when they are trying to say something to us, and they cannot get or keep our attention. Not only do they want our attention, but they also yearn for a parent to understand what they are going through. They need for us to ask questions, not in a badgering manner but in a genuine desire to understand their thoughts, feelings, hurts and desires.

Some people are better at listening than others. Many of us struggle all our lives to be good listeners. One has to learn the art of listening. It is especially difficult for many who in their own family of origin were raised with the belief that

children should be seen and not heard. It is necessary we get our children to talk or share their daily activities such as a book they have read; a movie they saw; a trip to the beach or even a conflict with a friend. These could make good rapport sessions. Involving children in common interests such as pets, gardening, or sports make communication easier. Understanding their need for support can only come about by active listening.

Once children realise that their views and opinions are appreciated, they would be encouraged to talk. And then they would really begin to listen to us as adults. Only then respect and love would grow. Remember that respect is to fathers what communication is to mothers. And to gain respect we have to give respect.



eptember brings us to a very conventional part of an unconventional year as we mark Stewardship Month within the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago. It's a time when the spotlight is placed on the way in which human beings are called into account for the way in which we have managed God's resources in creation. It's also a time when we think about finances! However, this year's theme from the Board of Theological Education (BOTE) calls for quite a different perspective: "Overflow: Thankfulness in the Valley".

"You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies, you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows." ~ Psalm 23:5

Without a doubt, September

2020 truly represents a valley in society. Covid-19 has thrown the entire world into disarray, disproportionately affecting the most vulnerable populations. Job security, food security, physical safety, economic health and, of course, physical health are all now on the line. September marks the beginning of a new normal in education as well as teachers, parents and students aim for a hybrid model to impart knowledge in the safest way. However, approximately 65,000 children will be without the necessary technological and online resources to fully participate in school life this semester.

In the midst of this darkness - this Valley - we are being called to shift focus away from our scarcity and fears in a highly transactional world, toward the provision and security found in God, the Shepherd.

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (NRSV) ~ 1st Thessalonians 1:16-18

This year's stewardship month requires us to commit to the "always", "without ceasing" and "all circumstances" pattern of giving thanks. It is no longer about the great abundance of material things we may possess that we can now lavishly and easily give to others and towards the building of God's Kingdom because we are on the mountaintops of achievement and happiness. Our thankfulness has to maintained, expressed and celebrated in the darkest and deepest of valleys.

The BOTE encourages us to explore this message through four themes during this month of September:

WEEK 1: "IN THE VALLEY: THE PREPARED TABLE"

The first Sunday of September sets the tone for the month by looking at the Table Ministry that God practices throughout salvation history. This Table Ministry reminds us that God prepares the table for "me", in a very personal manner. However, this does not mean that whatever we want to eat is at the Table. We must submit to God and embrace the special relationship that God desires to build with us. This is especially done through the celebration of the Eucharist (a Thanksgiving meal) for the Sacrament of Holy Communion that also shows that we must have a relationship with others, as well as God. When we consider that God's Table has more than enough room for all, it is a call for us now to be good stewards of that invitation and extend it to others who may be starving spiritually and physically.

WEEK 2: IN THE VALLEY: THE ANOINTING OF PURPOSE

Scripture: 1st John 2:27,29

To anoint means to consecrate and set apart something/someone, usually with oil, for the work, witness and glory of God. When the Psalmist says, "He anoints my head

with oil", it points to a powerful truth that we, as God's children, have a specific purpose to fulfil. God's Spirit dwells in each of His people, and this is what equips us to endure the Valley. This Anointing of Purpose also means that Christ is our guiding light and compass who will lead us through the Valley of the Shadow of Death. Good Advice

hen a judge or magistrate passes judgement on a person found guilty, a comment that is often made is "I hope this will teach you a lesson". We all hope so, for punishment should lead to contrition and improvement of character. Unfortunately, the lesson is not always learnt, and we see many repeat offenders and those who have found new ways to commit crimes.

We must not presume that because good advice is offered, religious rites are practices or serious warnings are delivered, human nature will be changed for the better. In this letter, the apostle James tells the congregation not to fool themselves; they must not only listen to God's Word but must obey it, or it will be "like glancing at your face in a mirror. You see yourself, walk away, and forget what you look like." (James 1:22-24) It is far easier to look at other people and point out their spots and blemishes.

How many of us know religious leaders who boldly and regularly

remind their people of the virtues of self-denial and sincerity in daily living, while accumulating for themselves wealth and public praise with little thought of charity and sacrificial service! How many of us know national leaders who are always summoning their people to fairness, justice and accountability while disregarding these essential qualities in their personal career! We are not to presume that it is always easy to practice what we preach and advocate as the right and good thing to do.

Simon Peter, the "rock" among
Jesus' disciples, was confident
he would never forsake Jesus
even if all the others did. When
Jesus spoke about the impending
crucifixion, Peter rebuked him "God
forbid it, Lord. That must never
happen to you." (Matthew 16:22)
But Jesus rebuked him in turn "Get
away from me Satan. Your thoughts
do not come from God but from
human nature.

(Matthew 16:23) Jesus knew human nature. He knew the real characters under the masks of piety and sanctity. He knew the motivations of the heart even when the hands are stretched out in charity or uplifted in prayer. He knew Peter would fail when the real test came. So, when Jesus was being questioned by the High Priest, some persons recognized Peter in the courtyard as a companion of Jesus. But Peter strongly denied the accusation. "I swear that I am telling you the truth. May God punish me if I am not. I do not know that man." (Matthew 26:74)

Do not presume we will stand up for the truth when the day of reckoning comes, or we will tell the truth when it is not financially advantageous or not very safe. We must recognise we are all prone to evil and slothful in good. An honest look in the mirror will send us to do more confessing and repenting than judging and boasting. As the Reformer Martin Luther said, "A Christian is never in a state of completion but always in the process of becoming."

uring the 'stay at home' lockdown of nCoViD-19 did you encounter anyone who looked familiar but who seemed to be strange to you in your home?

Was it someone you called wife, husband, mother, father, daughter, son, brother, or sister? There were many instances of this occurring in homes and residences all around the world as people discovered their neighbours and even persons who were always in the same or the next room.

Do not be troubled if you discovered someone or rediscovered family whom you knew in the past but lost somewhere along the way? Especially for those rediscovered under your roof, what is the plan since these experiences will continue to impact both you and the other person the future?

nCoViD-19 has brought us face to face with the reality and truth that families consist of similarly minded or differently minded individuals who use the place of residence as a home or as a transit station or hub to meet or rush towards their demanding schedules of work, school and play. In some instances, there was little socialising and interactions but there existed social and emotional distancing even to the point of isolation called independence.

Are not members of a family codependent on each other for growth and maturing whether their exchanges are negative, positive, or indifferent? Invariably that established an existing 'normal' transaction zone but did the 'stay at home' nCoViD-19 lockdown forcedenforced or facilitated human interactions as its catastrophic magnitude alike a natural disaster resulted in reshaping a new normal that surely impacts living, survival and continued existence?


While some of these psychosocial even religious discomforts and experiences may have been traumatic, in other instances they may have brought decisions, reconciliation and healing. This may have confirmed why a person should continue to stay and adjust or get as far away as possible from family, not so?

At writing, global positive nCoViD-19 cases have surpassed 22 million with 778,000 deaths. As for Trinidad and Tobago the recent phase 2 surge have increased positive cases to near 600 with 12 deaths. Lesser lockdown and orders have been reinstated yet we are reminded to 'stay at home'.

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Whatever may be your family's circumstances, experience the joys of being together as you work, play, and pray and be thankful. Make full use of this time to discover and rediscover your family and yourself. Never let it be that the family can NOT as changes occur and the family is called to adapts and adjust.

Do not lose faith. Hold strong. Believe, The Family Can.

MOSES and the 12 spies



his month, we continue with the story of Moses from our Virtual Vacation
Bible School.

Do you remember that Moses, guided by God, led the Israelites out of Egypt and away from the wicked Pharaoh? What do you remember about the story?

God promised His people that He would lead them to the Promised Land called Canaan. When the Hebrew people reached near the edge of Canaan, God told Moses to choose one leader from each tribe to go exploring (the Israelites were divided into twelve tribes or groups). Moses told them, "Go see what the land is like, and whether the people there are strong or weak, few or many. Look at whether the land they live in is good or bad, and what kinds of towns they live in, and whether the land is rich or poor."

The men went into the land and found that it really was a good. The

grapes were so big that it took two men to carry a cluster of them on a pole between them. But the people there were very big and tall, and the spies were afraid of them. They were gone for forty days.

When the spies returned, they went to Moses and Aaron, and the rest of the Israelites gathered. The men showed the Israelites the large bunch of grapes, pomegranates, and figs. The Israelites became very excited as they had hoped to hear good news.

"But" ten of the spies began to tell the people about the giants and how fearful they were. They told of large cities with high walls around them. "The people who live there are powerful, and the cities are strong and large." Caleb, one of the spies, said, "Let us go up at once and occupy it, for we are well able to overcome it with God on our side." He had seen the land for himself and knew God would give it to them. The other spies quickly



began to argue with him, "We cannot attack those people. They are giants! They are stronger than we are! We felt like grasshoppers next to them."


Discouragement settled over the camp, and the people began to weep. "It would have been better to die in Egypt or even here in the wilderness!" the people cried. "Let's go back to Egypt!" Moses and Aaron fell with their faces to the ground. Caleb and one of the other spies, Joshua, tore their clothes in frustration and held up their hands for silence. "The land is exceedingly great," they said. "God will give it to us. Don't be afraid of the people there because God is with us." The crowd was not listening and shouted, "Let's stone them!" pointing to Moses, Aaron, Caleb. and Joshua.



SPY ABINOCULARS

THINGS YOU WILL NEED:

2 empty toilet rolls, decorations: like markers, poster paints, glitter, your favourite spy stickers, some colourful gift paper, craft materials (it's best you use whatever you have available rather than purchase!), you also need some scotch or making tape, yarn which is twine or you could even use ribbon and a one-hole paper punch.

1. DECORATE THE ROLLS






