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God's Light Came in Time of Darkness



y the time this printed edition of the Trinidad Presbyterian reaches you many important events would have passed – the US Presidential Elections; the 2021 Budget of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) being accepted; many lives lost through nCoViD-19, murder and road carnage; and

of course, the Advent/Christmas season would have begun..

There is no doubt that our life-style has been interrupted this year, not only by Covid-19, but by many unforeseen circumstances such as violent crimes, road carnage, illness, conflicts, disappointments, unemployment... and the list goes on.

Moderator speaks

You may be tired of hearing of these negatives and need to get more positive vibes in this season of Advent and Christmas. I certainly agree, but we cannot deny the reality of the day. That, my dear friends, is the story of Bethlehem! The Hymn writer puts it this way, "In the dark streets shineth the everlasting light." Yes. God's greatest light came in a time of darkness and despair. It seems like a paradox. This Babe in a manger, Jesus, was born to die that we might live eternally.

We cannot turn a blind eye to the reality that children, women, and men were murdered this year. Road indiscipline has also taken many lives, including one of our very own, Jonas Dukhedin-Lalla, the brother of our immediate past-Moderator. The tragic passing of Jonas brings to mind the many friends, relatives and parishioners who died through the recklessness of others. Indeed, the entire church community is enjoined in the suffering faced by families who have lost loved ones at the hands of drunk or reckless drivers.

These senseless deaths should move us to ask, as the Prophet Jeremiah did centuries ago in Lamentations Chapter 1:12: "Is it nothing to you who pass this way? Look and see if there is any sorrow like my sorrow." The Book of Lamentations records this cry of anguish and also gave the assurance of God's promises in the midst of Jeremiah's suffering when he viewed the destruction of Jerusalem. Jeremiah cried over the destruction that Jerusalem had brought upon itself by turning away from God and trusting in the practices of other nations.

While tears flow for murdered women and children we also ask ourselves... Is it nothing to you? While the road carnage and fatalities increase and while many try to find solutions to curb reckless and drunken driving we ask ourselves.... Is it nothing to you? While frontline medical workers try assiduously to preserve life in this global pandemic, we ask ourselves... Is it nothing to you? While governments and nations try to flatten the curve through needed restrictions and some simply ignore them, we ask ourselves... Is it nothing to you?

Yes. It should mean something to you and to me! We have a corporate responsibility to create a culture of care, compassion, and concern for human life. We must take every step to ensure that our actions will never result in recklessly causing the death of another human being. The clarion call is made once again to be our sister's and brother's keeper and ensure absolute safety for all.

Life is unpredictable! God does not give assurance against accidents, death, illness, hardships, failure, trouble, or suffering. We too must

The nCoViD-19 pandemic took the education system into a new dimension of delivering the schoolcurriculum to students in both the Primary and Secondary schools.

The goal was to obtain suitable devices, through the kind donations from well-wishers, businesses, individuals, and the Pastoral Regions. Through this project, tablet computers were distributed to students in need of such, which allowed them to access the online platforms of learning. COUNSELLING COLUMN WITH BERNADETTE GYAN-MANICKCHAND

How can parents and guardians help their children to resist "dares"?



any teenagers and even pre-teens at some point in their _lives are tempted to "prove their worth", to be accepted by their peers. Then, even the most wonderful youngster may become extremely vulnerable to the compelling logic of a dare or "negative peer pressure" as we call it. Under certain conditions young people must perform a dare - no matter how silly, dangerous, disgusting, or obnoxious it is. If he or she fails to comply then "respect" is lost in the eyes of the peers.

The pressure to perform is seen most clearly in the dangerous types of dares among older teenagers (drug/alcohol usage or even an act of violence), while younger children on the other hand, are more inclined to pulling playful pranks. (Pre-teens may for example, accept a dare to put glue on the teacher's chair, demonstrate rude behaviour to an adult, or hide a sibling's phone or diary). Dare situations may develop even when the gang is not present. Psychologically, the child may feel that the gang is looking over his shoulder. What do adults do then? We become sensitive to our charges need to "fit in". Therefore, we try to not scold or demand compliance to shame or demean. Insensitivity on the adult's part can result in silly, stubborn, or more defiant behaviour. In dealing with a dare, avoid extraneous reasoning or comparisons such as "When I was a boy, I would never have done that"

If your youngster is heavily dependent on what you consider the bad standards of his group, the worst thing you can do is preach against the group. This is considered an additional dare, as the child would want to show loyalty to the group, despite knowing better and being sure that you are right. Strengthening your child's own judgement and awareness is the only way to help. However, this can be a time-consuming job, so perseverance is key. Remember that success is not achieved overnight

KNOW YOUR SERIES It Is Christmas, Let Us Sing!

t is Christmas! The houses in many neighbourhoods have Christmas lights; Christmas carols are being sung at church services; Christmas music is playing nonstop on the radio, and if it were any other year but 2020, we would be hearing groups of carollers or even parranderos everywhere we go. People are excited about this heartwarming season. For Christians, Christmas carols are an important aspect of this jubilation.

One of the earliest Christmas carols was the 129 AD 'Angels Hymn'. Around this time, Christianitythemed hymns started taking over the previous pagan songs celebrating Winter Solstice. Slower and more solemn hymns started to emerge in the 4th century, and by the 12th, songs referring to Nativity themes and creatures had emerged. Other traditional carols attributed to the Middle Ages include 'God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen' and 'While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks by Night'. By the 19th Century, carols were being consistently collected and disseminated across Christendom.

The term "carols" is likely derived from the French word "carole" and the Latin word "carula" meaning a circular dance. Both dances and songs were given Christian significance and words with an overall message of awe, humility, hope and abundant joy. The religious carols we sing at Christmas have certain features about them:

TOPIC: Christmas hymns are usually about the nativity- the birth of Jesus Christ. Religious Christmas carols sing of the message and importance of the birth of Christ to us. Some of the Christmas hymns are imaginative and visualize the atmosphere of "silence" in the manger. Some sing about the spiritual reality of the Incarnation (God becoming flesh).

TRADITION: Many of our Christmas hymns were written a long time ago but their powerful meaning and eternal relevance mean that we sing them with new understanding every time we encounter them. The hymn we have in the Book of Praise at #163 "Of eternal love begotten" comes from words written around the fourth century but its theology **REVEREND ADRIAN SIEUNARINE**

is vibrant and its meaning is encouraging to those who learn it as a new song today to cherish the everlasting promises of God.

TIMING: Some Christmas hymns were not originally written for Christmas! "Joy to the World" was written by Isaac Watts as a paraphrase of Psalms 96 and 98. However, the promise of the Lord who has come, is here and will come again was in tune with Christmas.

Let us pay attention to the words of the songs we sing this Christmas season. They sing of a reality we understand, the birth of a baby in poverty. Yet they announce realities beyond our comprehension: the immortal, invisible God has become enfleshed in time and space and humility. For us. Thanks be to God. Let us sing.

A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE MODERATOR OF SYNOD THE RT. REVEREND JOY ABDUL-MOHAN



"And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven and on earth peace among those whom he favors." - St Luke 2:13

ne of the loveliest **Christmas Passages** from Luke chapter 2, contains the angels' song giving praise to God and proclaiming peace on earth. It acknowledges God's power and the peace and joy that will be enjoyed by all generations. However, the angels' song may seem a little difficult to resonate with in these unprecedented times. How can we experience the Glory of God and Peace on Earth amid all the mayhem and challenges in these times?

Imagine sitting around one evening when suddenly a host of angels comes upon you. Understandably, the shepherds were very afraid. In Old Israel, the appearance of angels terrified the prophets and added to their horror because most times the angels' purpose was to deliver the message of God, good and not so good news. In Luke 2, despite the awesomeness of their appearance and reputation, these angels brought a message of Glory to God and Peace on earth which the shepherds found irresistible. What did the angels mean by Glory to God?

In the Old Testament, the term Glory literally meant 'weighty' – something of substance. It was used to describe the presence of Another message enshrined in the Angel's song is a message of peace – 'Shalom'. It refers to a presence of harmony, wholeness and the completeness that come when one's life corresponds to the will of God. In such peace and wholeness, the ultimate relationship between God and humans; humans and humans; and humans and nature is restored to its rightful place. This peace gives glory to God and heals the divisions in the world. O! How we yearn for that peace which passes all understanding.

However, we humans cannot manufacture true peace. The only power that can create true Peace equal standard for all regardless of color, creed, race, age or gender. It means an acknowledgement and recognition of not only our own worth, but also that of others. When such peace dwells within men and women, there can still be hope for peace among all people in the world.

During this Christmas season, despite the burdens we may have to bear, the sorrows we may have to face, the pain we may have to endure, let us seek to be at peace with God and others. Let it begin with ourselves so that we may become "magnets of peace".

The glory of God, then is essentially the radiance of God's presence, which can be felt and seen. This is how God broke through human flesh.

God in the pillar of fire and smoke, which preceded the Israelites wandering in the wilderness. They called this the 'Shekinah' - God coming to human beings in their humble tents and camping with them. The glory of God then, is essentially the radiance of God's presence, which can be felt and seen. This is how God broke through human flesh. The angels saw the Glory of God in a child. cradled amid the filth of a cattle stall, and ultimately who will be rejected and crucified. Those who could see God in human form were no longer wandering in the darkness. For they had seen the 'Shekinah' - the Glory of God.

is God's, hence the cry for a deeper and more lasting Peace. This is what the angels proclaimed: a peace which the world cannot give and the world cannot take away – a peace of mind and soul. Peace in the valley of the shadow. This Peace comes, not from the absence of trouble or conflict, but from the presence of God, the glory of God in Christ, the Prince of Peace!

But how do we achieve that inner peace? There is an implicit basis for peace in the Golden rule – "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." This means that true peace should be based on justice and equality; it means May the message of the angels' song inspire us to bear witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ, so that there will be hope and peace in our hearts, love and joy in our deeds, and solidarity with all humanity, as we sing sincerely and meaningfully "Glory to God in the highest heaven and on earth peace among those whom he favours!"

In the name of the God who is with us, Jesus Christ – The Prince of Peace. Amen.

But still, not quite! Before their eyes, it was finally revealed - a host of angels singing a song so sweet that the Saviour had been born.



Deed of Covenant Explained

Deed of Covenant is a legal document that is made between an individual (or a company) and the Church. It allows persons (or companies) who annually pledge a financial contribution to the Church (being an ecclesiastical institution), the opportunity to make such a contribution in a legally binding covenant.

In doing so the individual is allowed a tax deduction that can be equal to up to 15% of their total income.

This is an excellent way for persons to pledge their support to the PCTT and also receive a rebate when they file their taxes. Companies can also use this as a tax write-off on their tax returns.

Kindly contact the Synod office or your local church for Deed of Covenant forms if you are interested. Please note that the Synod office is required to place stamp and seal on the document as part of the process.

Pass the word on in your churches. This is an excellent way to give to the Church and positively affect your taxes. It's a win-win for everyone.





Merry Christmas from the Communications' Committee!






