JESUS CHRIST

By the time this issue of the Trinidad Presbyterian reaches you, the 61st Annual General Meeting of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) would have been well on its way to completing the agenda

Moderator *speaks*

for yet another term. All this in the midst of a spike in COVID-19 cases, which sadly, our churches have been directly affected by.

Each Synodical year, we give an account of our stewardship and put on record the various events and activities that shape the Vision and Mission mandated to each Court, Standing Board and Committee of the PCTT. However, it is intriguing that these reports will be read many years from now by researchers who may want to find out how we lived out the Gospel in the context of our times. Indeed, 2020 had not only been unusual and unprecedented – it had been historic.

After more than a year we are still grappling with COVID-19. I remind you of what I said in the Moderator's 2020 Report – that as a people of faith, the PCTT discovered its ingenuity out of necessity in the face of a Global Pandemic. laity of our beloved Presbyterian Church for their unanimous and overwhelming support in electing me to serve another two-year term as Moderator of the Synod. Indeed, it has been a blessing to journey with you for the past two years. There were challenging moments due to the Global Pandemic as well as some exhilarating moments and everything else in between. I am humbled for the opportunity to serve for another two years and to be part of such a rich and noble heritage.

As I reminded the Synod members in the inaugural worship, year after year men and women hear the Lord's call and those who heed that call dedicate themselves to love and serve Jesus Christ with enthusiasm. This calls for re-dedication from those of us who have been long-standing members of the PCTT, as well as those serving in various orders of the Ministry and as members of the Synod. This is a time of re-commitment as stewards of God's kingdom.

It is commendable when we do things like visiting the sick and needy, and raising funds for a "noble cause". However, we must be careful not to love what we do in serving Jesus more than Jesus himself or what he requires of us. We should always guard against loving our plans, projects, rituals, ourselves, or anyone else more than Jesus. Jesus should be at

It is my prayer that we will continue to work in Partnership Ministry to achieve the goals set before us, and to fulfil the mission of Christ as we aim to make the Gospel of Jesus Christ a living reality. May we continue to grow spiritually in Christ and encourage each other to live faithfully in Him, as we build sustainable relationships in community. May God bless us all!



NO Victors in Fanning HATE

Within recent weeks hate blogs bordering on racism in its rawest incarnation have found its way on the social and mainstream media – much to the dismay of all right-thinking citizens of our twin-island Republic. While we understand that this base level of human character in no way defines who we are in Trinidad and Tobago, it is a matter of concern because it has no place in a multi-ethnic, multi-religious, literate society as ours. Indeed, it is a development that deserves the widest condemnation by all who cherish brotherly peace, love for humanity and goodwill inherent in the Easter message.

What is equally reprehensible is the tendency for those spewing hate to base that hatred on a false premise. When we reach the stage where we cannot empathise with a fallen brother or sister, then something is desperately wrong with us. We may disagree with others, but this does not mean that we must be disagreeable. It is always possible for us to influence others to accept one another's

point of view through dialogue and a civil approach to solving disagreements. It benefits no one to have a shouting match to make a point. It is said that only those who argue issues without substance resort to violent, personal attacks.

Those who are inclined to fan hate and animosity to advance political, social or even economic agendas do not understand the dangerous powder-keg such indulgence can generate.

If the atrocities of slavery 400 years ago or indentureship 176 years ago are too far behind us to remember, then the April 1994 massacre of over 800,000 citizens of Rwanda in Africa should remind us of what reckless hate-filled statements can do in a plural society.

It is regrettable that in Trinidad and Tobago today, there are several TV and radio hosts who do nothing to put a halt to hate comments from callers. Freedom of expression is not a licence for incitement. We are only to remind ourselves of what took place in Rwanda 27 years ago when a radio host allowed hate

comments to be broadcast, resulting in a tribal civil war with murderous consequences. There are six sites in Rwanda today that display the skulls of those killed in this senseless civil war – testimony that there are no victors in stirring up hatred. We need to remind ourselves that ethnic hatred can lead to discrimination, which leads to alienation that eventually fragments a society. We have the power to stop that slide.

Our Constitution protects our rights. Our conscience imposes responsibility. We are free to criticise those who govern us and those whom we elect to conduct our business – whether in government, opposition, in church or civil society. We must do so, however, with dignity and respect. Sadly, we lack the appetite for tolerance. All is not lost. As a Church we follow the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ, and firmly believe in the New Commandment that we must love one another. We commend this Commandment to all. .



PCTT SYNOD MODERATOR RE-ELECTED

The Right Reverend Joy Evelyn Abdul-Mohan was re-elected unopposed for a second term as Moderator of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT), during the 61st Annual General meeting of the Church.

The Synod AGM was held from Thursday 22 April 2021 to Saturday 24 April 2021 and the meeting was held in a blend of virtual and in-person due to the current restrictions imposed by Government to combat the deadly Covid-19 virus. The election of a Moderator was on the agenda for the opening day and Members of the Synod were unanimous in their support of Reverend Abdul-Mohan.

PCTT General Secretary Terrence Warde pointed to Reverend Abdul-Mohan's astute leadership of the Church during the continuing pandemic as the main reason for her re-election as Moderator for a second term. He said the Church is still experiencing a period of

uncertainty with the pandemic and that unprecedented times call for leadership that is visionary and can navigate the unpredictable.

According to General Secretary Warde, "Reverend Abdul-Mohan's style of management of the Church has always been one of consensus, humility and servant-leadership, involving the Clergy, the Synod and the members of the Church in participatory and meaningful decision-making".

Reverend Abdul-Mohan, a former Independent Senator of the Parliament of Trinidad and Tobago, is well-known for her service to community, and continues to be an activist for change for various social issues, including gender-based violence. She is a former principal of the St Andrew's Theological College (SATC) and was the first local female graduate in the college's ministerial programme.

The Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago congratulates Reverend Joy Abdul-Mohan on her re-election

as Moderator for the next two years. She has served the PCTT as an Ordained Minister for the past 32 years. Reverend Abdul-Mohan obtained the Licentiate in Theology (L.Th) in 1987 from SATC and was ordained in 1989. She also obtained a Master of Arts (MA) degree from Princeton Theological Seminary in the USA in 1993.

During her first term, Reverend Abdul-Mohan was instrumental in launching the *Church Without Walls* online platform to continue the Church's outreach and connectivity to members during the lockdown last year. She was at the forefront of projects, which provided food support to families and online devices to needy students. Reverend Abdul-Mohan also supported outreach to the migrant population.

The Church welcomes her appointment and pray for God's blessings on the re-elected Moderator as she continues the work of the Lord.

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REVEREND ADRIAN SIEUNARINE, PRINCIPAL,
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LIVING FOR THE GOD WHO LOVES US

The Divine is one and Triune: three-in-one, one-in-three. The unity of God is fulfilled in the diverse ways in which the divine self is revealed to us. The Spirit is divine, as are the Father and the Son and we are blessed in the name of the Trinity (Mt. 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14; Rev. 1:4-6).

In the Old Testament, the Spirit is at work in several ways, for instance:

1. Creating (Gen. 1.2; Ps. 33:6)
2. Revealing (Isa. 61:1-6; Mic. 3:8)
3. Enabling for service (Ex. 31:2-6; Judg. 6:34; 15:14-15; Isa. 12)
4. Inward renewal (Ps. 51:10-12; Ezek. 36: 25-27).

Christ explains that the disciples would receive another "*Paraclete*" (Jn. 14:16), sometimes translated "Counsellor" or "Advocate" and meaning one who gives support – a helper, adviser, encourager and ally).

At Pentecost we celebrate that the Spirit comes to continue in us the teaching and testifying ministry of Christ.

Pentecost opens a new dimension of our journey, enhances our ministry and the experience of living for the God who loves us and equips us (1 Cor. 12: 4-11).

What does the Spirit do for us? Whatever the Spirit wills to do in and through us. The Spirit is Sovereign and free and cannot be controlled by us (Jn. 3:8) but chooses to channel in and through us.

The Spirit:

1. Speaks (Acts 1:16; 8:29; 13:2; 28:25)
2. Teaches (Jn. 14:26)
3. Witnesses (Jn. 15:26)
4. Searches (1 Cor 2:11)
5. Determines (1 Cor. 12:11)
6. Intercedes (Rom. 8:26-27)
7. Enlightens (Eph. 1:17-18)
8. Regenerates us (Jn. 3:5-8)
9. Leads us into holiness (Rom. 8:14; Gal. 5:16-18)
10. Transforms us (2 Cor. 3:18; Gal. 5: 22-23).

Even in the midst of the rigours and terrors of the pandemic, the Lord continues to be a rushing

wind, breathing new life into the Church by reminding us that we are the Church wherever we are. Fire continues to come down, separate itself and anoint us to show us that we are Spirit-filled with our individual fires readying us for service.

Pentecost transforms a ruin into a rocket: We have ignition. We have lift-off. We have the Spirit.

We can tell if we have the Spirit by our lives – rooted in God and blossoming in Christ, bearing the fruit of the Spirit: the nine features outlined in Gal. 5:22-23: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

All capabilities for life, work and service flow from our covenant relationship with the Lord, characterized by conversion and rebirth, which unites us vitally and eternally to the Risen Christ to the glory of the Father through the power and mystery of the Holy Spirit.

are boys more troublesome? *NOT REALLY!*

How can we begin changing inappropriate behaviours in our boys? – Part II

This aspect of boys' nature should be considered when planning for their training and development.

Any matured mother who has nurtured boys only would tell of the tender and caring side of the male of the species. Many mothers or mother-figures refuse to believe in male stereotyping and simply, nurture a precious child. The result is a respectable gentleman and a model citizen of society.

Why, then, are boys blamed mostly for knife crimes, bullying and drug addiction? According to surveys conducted at many schools today, males outnumber females in acts of delinquency. Just peruse the daily news – horrible stories of gender-based violence! Where does it start? When will it end?

Present-day data on differences in parenting styles reveal that very young and "immature" mothers of younger males feel less effective in training their sons when the father is absent. Fathers on the other hand are less likely to show warmth and protection to their young sons as

protection to their young sons as compared to their young daughters. Boys begin to develop aggression at an early age once they are slighted. Parents can consider the following where they see inappropriate behaviour especially in their young males::

1. *Borrow tactics from negotiation*, try to have a win-win solution each gets something positive in return.
2. *Talk above their age or maturity level*, invite your son's perspective on morality and ethical issues.
3. *Focus more on relating than teaching*, when we relate to our sons we enter their world.
4. *Be intentional with vocal tone and language*, be focused, steady, and direct.
5. *Outward behaviours are only the tip of the iceberg*, as parents we need to go under the water line. Build open relationships with our sons.



We began looking at the differences in nurturing or socialization of our males. Parents, guardians and even some teachers believe to some extent in gender stereotyping. Some adoption agencies have proof that boys are harder to adopt due to them being more "troublesome". But are they really? Yes, they take more risks, they climb, play boisterous games, and prefer the outdoors because of their investigate nature.

measure of happiness, peace and prosperity.

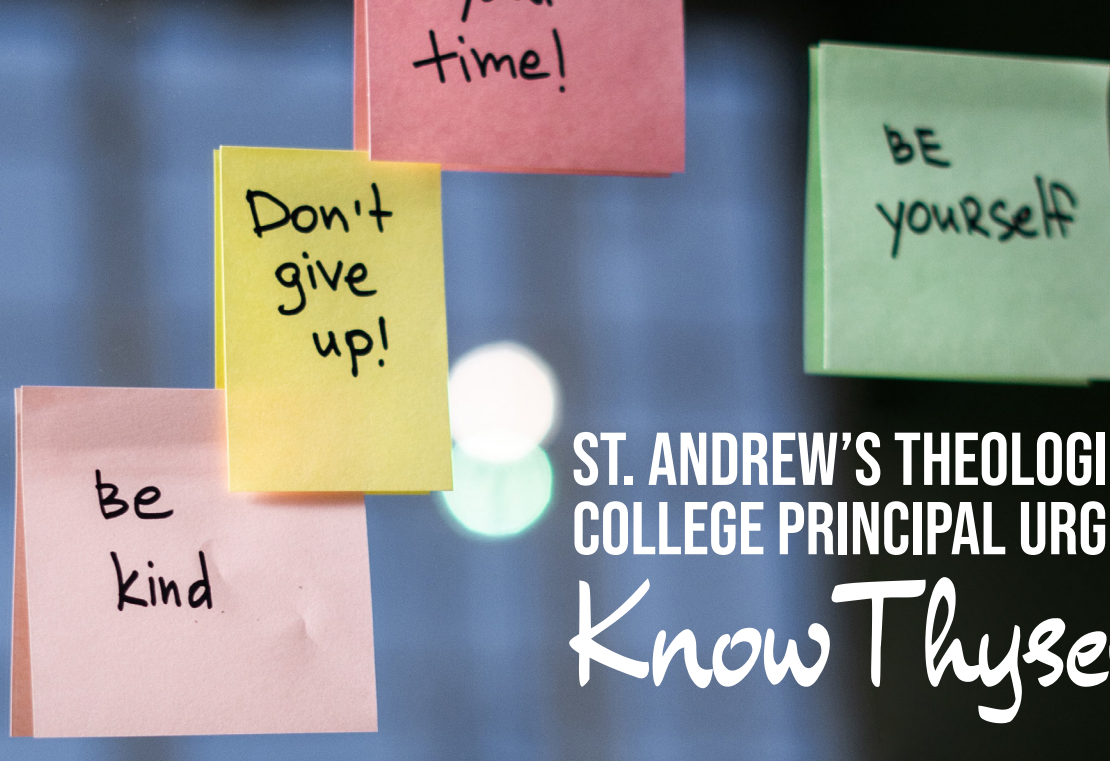
All these add to the crisis facing our mothers today, and by extension the crisis within the family. We need to address these with urgency.

ST. ANDREW'S THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE PRINCIPAL URGES...

Know Thyself

St. Andrew's Theological College Principal Reverend Adrian Sieunarine said the commandment to love your neighbour as yourself implies that we must first know ourselves. Reverend Sieunarine spoke at the Theological Education Sunday service at the St James Presbyterian Church in Tableland on Sunday 21 March 2021.

Local Board secretary Nazra Partap welcomed Reverend Sieunarine, reminding him that his father, the late Reverend Everson T. Sieunarine, had dedicated the church building on 22 April 1988, as the then

Moderator of Synod. She stated that church community would be celebrating 100 years on this present site next year.

In his homily, Reverend Sieunarine asked, "How can we love others as ourselves if we do not know ourselves?" He said that knowing oneself is critical in fostering community relationships. He urged the congregation to take time out to create a faithful life by studying God's Word, saying, "The day will come when people will know the Lord." He noted that "God calls us directly to fulfil a faithful life".

In knowing ourselves we discover that we make mistakes. He said we must learn from our mistakes and use that experience to "build others up". Referring to the global Covid-19 pandemic, Reverend Sieunarine said, "We are privileged in Trinidad and Tobago to be able to gather in our churches. It is not so in other countries. We can meet here and communicate with one another while observing the health regulations." He urged the congregation to remember that even though others may meet virtually, "they are still members of one community in the body of Christ".

- Uncertainty about the future

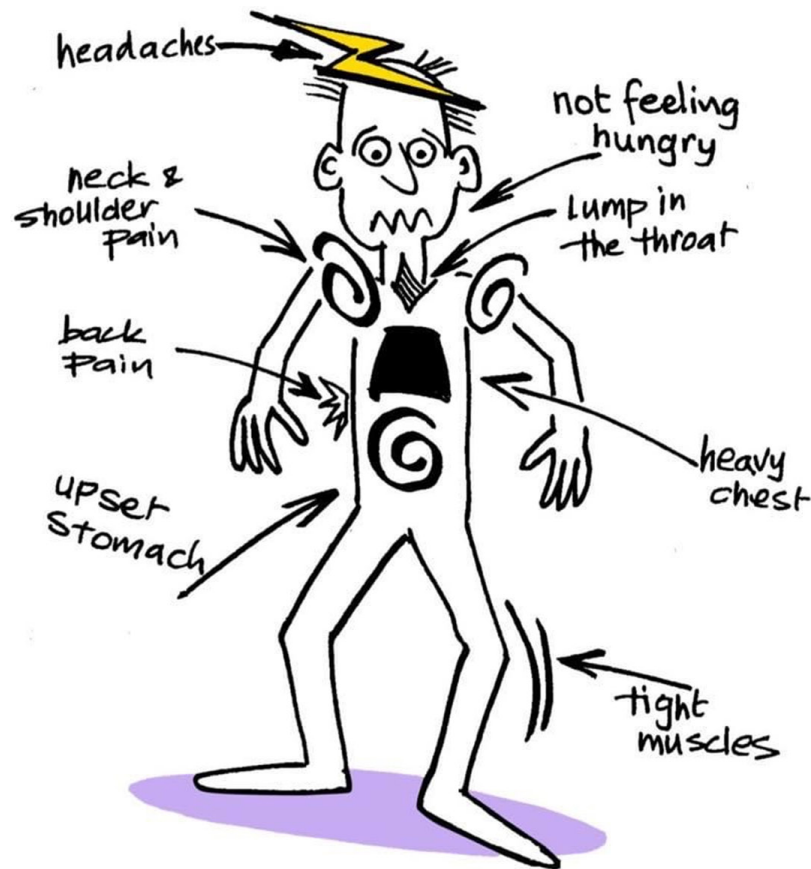
Everyone experiences stress at times. A little bit of stress is not a problem. However, high stress affects the body in different ways.

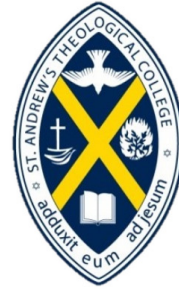

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Understanding Eldership

We publish below an article written by the late Reverend Everson Sieunarine several years before he passed away in 2017. Reverend Sieunarine was a past Moderator of Synod and in his quiet, unassuming manner, helped many to understand the governance structure of our church. This article on the Eldership is relevant as we begin another Synodical term.

The reproduced article:

AS AN ELDER

1. I have been nominated and approved not only to serve on the Local Board, but on the Session – the main administrative court of the Region. This also means I am eligible for election to the two higher courts of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago, which are the Presbytery and Synod.
2. I must regard my vows as a serious obligation to be a good example to others, in faithful church attendance, in offering my service to the Church, in my conduct and attitude, and in my relationships with others.
3. I must consider the unity, growth, and well-being of the Church above self-interest and self-promotion. .
4. I must guide, encourage, and inspire members of the congregation – especially the children and young people – in their Christian journey. I should suggest and advise where I believe can improve situations.
5. I must maintain a regular personal habit of prayer, Bible reading and keeping myself equipped for my responsibilities.
6. I must remember to regard the spiritual gifts of others as essential for the advancement of Christian witness in the world, and that Jesus Christ alone is the King, Head, Foundation of the Church.
7. I am called to assist in the administration of the Sacraments of the Church, which are Baptism and Holy Communion. I may also be asked to share in special occasions, like Confirmation and Admission of New Members, Marriages, and Funerals.
8. I must be willing to attend and take part in any Seminar, Study, Retreat, or Conference planned for the benefit of the Church, elders, and members.
9. I must remember that if at any time I am unable, unwilling or feel unprepared to continue my duties as an elder, I should notify the Minister and Local Board so that the necessary action can be taken.

HILLVIEW DEDICATES NEW BUILDINGS



Two new buildings at Hillview College in Tunapuna were dedicated by the Northern Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT), during a service at the College on 10 March 2021.

The buildings were named the Leslie C. Mahase Buildings, in honour of retiring principal Leslie Cyril Mahase.

College chaplain Reverend Anthony Rampersad delivered the homily during the worship service, while Presbytery chairman Reverend Winston Ramkissoon blessed the keys for the buildings, received from Acting Vice Principal Sharon

Ramdeen. The keys were then handed to retiring principal Mahase, who then passed it on to the acting principal Derek Bissessar.

In delivering the feature address, Mahase praised God for what he described as “an unforgettable moment in my life”. Mahase echoed the College’s motto, *Humani Nihil Alienum* as he chronicled the “ups and downs” in completing the project. He said the new buildings were necessary to meet the demands of an “increase in the overall student population since September 2003. He said make-shift classrooms were established in the Main Hall, on the pavilion, on the promenade at the front of the school, as well as in the open-air.

Mahase recalled, "To worsen the situation, the small single story building to the north of the main hall, constructed in the '60s, was deemed unsafe for occupation by the Ministry of Education. It had to be demolished. Its removal created a very large open space which was a prime spot for a new building." He noted that in 2012 the PSSBOE was informed and written documentation sent to the EFCL. He said that "within a short space of time, the final plans for the two

buildings received all the necessary protocols."

Mahase said when Hillview College celebrated its Diamond Anniversary in 2015, former Education Minister Dr Tim Gopeesingh turned the sod to start construction scheduled to begin in that year. The project was completed and the keys were handed over by the Ministry of Education to the then acting vice principal Derek Bissessar on 12 August 2020.

Mahase also paid tribute to former Education Minister Anthony Garcia and current Minister Dr Nyan Gadsby-Dolly, for supporting the completion of this project. A plaque was unveiled honouring the former Principal Leslie C. Mahase. At the ceremony were members of the Northern Presbytery, the PSSBOE, the Administrative Committee, the PTA, the Hillview Old Boys Association, some teachers, and students.





Navet Presbyterian Church Celebrates 91 Years

The Navet Presbyterian Church of the Nariva / Mayaro Pastoral Region celebrated its 91st Anniversary on Wednesday March 24 2021, during an annual Lenten service.

MESSAGE
