Coping with Grief in COVID-19

ne of the most difficult emotional experiences that we can ever have in life is the death of a loved one. The pain and grief that follows can seem overwhelming.

Grief is often described as one's feeling, but it includes a variety of human emotions and reactions which can affect how the bereaved think and behave. Grief goes on long after the death of loved ones. Although grief is extremely painful, it is the normal response to any loss and the agent for our healing. Grief enables the bereaved to re-adjust and cope with life without their loved ones.

Bereavement can be a very lonely time. However, one of the most helpful ways to cope with grief is by speaking with friends and family.

Coping with grief during the COVID-19 pandemic has proven to be extremely difficult.

An increasing number of people and households are being told to self-isolate or socially distance from friends and family.

This means the bereaved find themselves alone during the difficult time of grief, which causes increased feelings of loneliness, abandonment and helplessness and being lost.

The flip side can be you are isolated as a family together. This may provide some support at times, but the stress and tension of being locked in together can lead to arguments and finger pointing.

Children and teenagers may become restless because they are unable to meet with their friends. Keeping them occupied can prove to be quite difficult for family members who are themselves dealing with their own emotions and challenges.

Added to emotional challenges, are practical challenges, such as needing help with the provision or preparation of meals and shopping, as family and friends who previously assisted, may also be isolating, or taking care of their own families' situations.

Apart from these, the added COVID-19 restrictions and lock down measures induce greater

pain in grief.

With only ten persons being able to attend the funeral service, many family members, relatives, and friends must attend the service virtually. You may feel you cannot pay your last respects, and this increases your pain and sense of loss as there seems to be no physical support.

Family members living abroad cannot come home because the borders are closed. In some cases, only one member of a family lives in Trinidad and Tobago and, therefore, it is his or her responsibility to attend to all funeral arrangements alone.

There are cases where a person dies and has no family members in the country to make the funeral arrangements. Sometimes, a friend or neighbour undertakes to do what is needed.

Social distancing prevents family members from embracing and comforting one another.

All these new situations only increase your grief. Grief is difficult and painful to bear at any time. While COVID-19 may present added challenges to the process, the bereaved still experience all the normal pain of loss and separation. Each person will cope with grief in his or her own way. It is important to note that there is no correct way to grieve.

Here are some suggestions which may help the bereaved::

Allow yourself time to grieve.
 Remember the special times

- such as birthdays, anniversaries, the birth of a child and spend time looking at old photos. On these occasions, it would be good to have extra support.
- If you feel like crying, do not prevent yourself from doing so as it is a good way to release your deep feelings and should never be regarded as a sign of weakness.
- Do not rush into decisions about the possessions and personal effects of your loved ones.
- Do not make major decisions that you have not thought out well.
- Avoid dependence on substances such as alcohol, medications or drugs to help you cope with your feelings as addictions can be formed.
- Your loved one will always be an important part of your life and memories. Keepsakes, such as photographs or other possessions, of your loved one may be painful to look at early in your bereavement but can bring great comfort in the future.
- If you realize your emotions and feelings are affecting your daily functioning, please do not hesitate to call your doctor or seek counselling.

"Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9).



ay 30th, 2021 – a significant day in the life of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT), not only because on this day the Church observed Trinity Sunday, or because the Country recognised the 176th Anniversary of Indian Arrival, but it was also the Commissioning of the 19th Deaconess in the PCTT, Amber Seesahai-Payne.

Amid a Pandemic and State of Emergency where gatherings like these are limited to five persons, this virtual service was well planned and well executed by a competent technical team, allowing others to be witnesses and participants. The fact that only three members of the Clergy and Amber were physically present at the Commissioning Service at the St. Andrew's Theological College in no way took away from the service. Mr Christopher Sookhoo was truly a blessing with his beautiful singing and his expertise at the organ.

Leader of Worship, Reverend
Brenda Bullock, lead the service
seamlessly, while Reverend Ria
Thompson-Jimdar prepared our
hearts and minds, by inviting the
Holy Spirit to be in every part of the
service as she led in the Prayer of
Approach and Confession.

In his contribution, the General Secretary of the PCTT, Mr Warde, reminded us that the Deaconess Order in the PCTT began in 1960 and that the last Deaconess was ordained in 2010. It is an Order, he said, which began with the Bible Women of old, comprising women who worked tirelessly spreading the Word, and devoted themselves to the women and youth in Christian Education and Pastoral Care. He stated that Amber would add value to the Deaconess Order and would be an encouragement to other young women to join this Order.

Reverend Radica Moonoo read the first Scripture passage from Romans 16: 1 – 20, while Deaconess Calpurnia Chance continued with Luke 8: 1 – 3. This was followed by the Prayer of Thanksgiving and Intercession lead by the Principal of St Andrew's Theological College (SATC), Reverend Adrian Sieunarine. He thanked God for blessing His people throughout the ages and for the people who inspire those who continue in Christ's service. He prayed for Amber who has been set apart for His Holy service. The dedication of an offering was done by Presiding Elder, Mr Roy Ramlogan.

Amber requested Reverend
Annabell Lalla-Ramkhelawan, who
began her ministry as a Deaconess,
served as the immediate past
Moderator and who was one of
Amber's lecturers at SATC to
bring the message. Reverend
Lalla-Ramkelawan preached
about "A Romance with Christ,"
of which the main element is
"LOVE." Using this theme, Reverend
Lalla-Ramkelawan illustrated her
message through an acronym:

"L" as in Love - we cannot be

committed and passionate servants for Christ if we do not love Him wholeheartedly (Matt. 22: 37) and love all humanity (John 15:12).

"O" as in Obedience – in Christ, we find the perfect model of obedience (John 14: 23). True Christian obedience follows from a heart of gratitude for the grace we have received from the Lord. Obedience is the proof of love for God.

"V" as in Voice – servants of Christ must boldly proclaim the Word of God (Matt. 10: 7 & Acts 4: 31).

"E" as in Excitement – Servants of Christ must be filled with excitement for the ministry for which they have been called (Rom. 12: 11). A ministry that is not energised, filled with excitement and the power of the Holy Spirit soon becomes a burden and a heavy weight that makes us grow dim and our passion soon fades.

In concluding, Reverend Lalla-Ramkelawan reminded Amber to always remember she is a servant – one dedicated to service.

Amber was then presented to The Moderator, The Rt. Reverend Joy Abdul-Mohan, for Commissioning by Reverend Shirvan Siloch, Chairman of The Board of Theological Education. The Moderator commended women who from the inception of the Church gave "Sacrificial Service" and displayed "Servant Leadership."

A confident Amber responded loud and clear. The Laying of Hands was done by The Moderator, Reverend Brenda Bullock and Reverend Shirvan Siloch while the viewing audience was encouraged to reach towards Amber. After the Commissioning, Deaconess Amber Seesahai-Payne was presented with a copy of The Holy Bible.

Greetings were brought by

the Chairpersons of the three
Presbyteries: South Eastern – Mr
Ashford Tamby who commended
Deaconess Amber's involvement
in the Youth Camps, South Central
– ReverendStephen Harripersad
who expressed gratitude that she
answered the call to serve the

from the Northern Presbytery drew
a parallel between Deaconess
Amber and the young Timothy in
2nd Timothy 1: 7 and advised her to

s Emancipation Day approaches, questions arise and discussions emerge asking if we are really free or if we are still in some forms of mental, emotional, spiritual, financial and/or cultural bondage.

Jesus gives and guarantees true freedom (John 8:36). What are some of the effects of this freedom?

We recognise that we were once slaves to sin (Romans 6:15-23): Life is lived forwards but only understood backwards. With hindsight, our gratitude to God for experiences we were privileged to have deepens as our holy happiness heightens.

Grace abounds much more than sin (Romans 5:20).

- We were meant to be free: We celebrate our freedom. We do not return to slavery (Romans 6:1) but we celebrate the life of grace-found, grace-full freedom we have. Emancipation is wonderful! It is for freedom that Christ set us free! (Galatians 5:1)
- 3. We realize that in giving ourselves to God, our freedom is made perfect: Now that we are free, we realise that the traps and tricks of evil may still ensnare us. The price of freedom is faithful, eternal vigilance; so we cheerfully consecrate ourselves by

dedicating all that we are to God who makes us more than we could ever begin to imagine.

Let us think about the pathways and processes of liberation in every area of our lives and society.

The blessedness of deliverance means that in every sphere of earthly existence, heaven can and shall prevail over the chains of evil and stain of sin, when we appreciate that the call and destiny of freedom means that we can now relate to one another as fellowshipping individuals in a free community of devoted service (Galatians 5:13). Let us hasten the work of emancipation for all creatures!


Slaves to Righteousness

¹⁵ What then? Shall we sin because we are not under the law but under grace? By no means! ¹⁶ Don't you know that when you offer yourselves to someone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one you obey—whether you are slaves to sin, which leads to death, or to obedience, which leads to righteousness? ¹⁷ But thanks be to God that, though you used to be slaves to sin, you have come to obey from your heart the pattern of teaching that has

now claimed your allegiance. ¹⁸ You have been set free from sin and have become slaves to righteousness.

¹⁹ I am using an example from everyday life because of your human limitations. Just as you used to offer yourselves as slaves to impurity and to ever-increasing wickedness, so now offer yourselves as slaves to righteousness leading to holiness. ²⁰ When you were slaves to sin, you were free from the control of righteousness. ²¹ What benefit did you reap at that time from the things you are now ashamed of? Those things result in death! ²² But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. ²³ For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life inlal Christ Jesus our Lord.

THE FAMILY CAN: A MONTHLY THOUGHT TO HELP IMPROVE THE FAMILY | HILTON R SIBOO

n attaining the age of 18 a child legally becomes an adult for the rest of their lives. As such, psychologists have determined stages of adulthood with "young adults" or "early adulthood" referring to those between the ages of 20 to 40. At this age, it is found that their desires, dreams, and goals are geared towards freedom and independence and for self-determination based on their choices. However, social, economic, political, educational, and even religious structures and systems sometimes make this independence and selfactualisation difficult to achieve.

In previous generations life was a much simpler, almost 'one-track' sequence of school-to-work-to-marriage, with formal education officially over by 16 or 20. At present, education goes to 20 or beyond 25 by which time work, marriage, family, and family life responsibilities may be reduced central purposes. Does this mean that their stages and phases of human development have been delayed?

Young adults of today toe the similar line of school-to-work-to-marriage, but on their own terms and conditions. Vast changes to traditional religious, cultural,

political, and family norms, values, morality, coupled with what can be called a 'migrant syndrome' associated with the mutation and variants of crime, violence, hedonism and sexuality, have all impacted the world of today's young adults – even further compounded by the COVID-19 Pandemic..

Goals and the ability to own property are stymied mainly because employment is hardly permanent and lifelong anymore, but now tends toward "short-term" contracts, which has removed the job security on which future life-plans and long-term goals for individuals and families were ultimately made.

Education is never ending. Employment opportunities become almost cyclical in the pursuit of financial success. Roles and responsibilities for relationships so often leads to separation, divorce, and death, as persons lack the coping mechanisms, skills, willingness, and resources to resolve or allow for intervention. Academic knowledge, the worldwide web and social media cannot reason and guide the maturing young adult of today to understand how to blame and who to bless.

These crises among young adults result in frustration, depression, aggression, anger, violence, suicide, mental and physical health issues. All these have further contributed to the array of crises within the family. Who can help to understand these predicaments? At some subsequent issues we hope these can be addressed.

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Never let it be said that the family cannot adjust as changes occur.

What can a parent or guardian do to help their child who has been traumatised? (Part Two)

PART ONE: RECAP

rauma, according to mental health specialists can be explained as the response to a deeply disturbing or overwhelming event that brings about feelings of helplessness or an inability to cope. It can diminish one's sense of self and one's ability to experience a full range of emotions. It can even bring about uncontrollable inappropriate emotions.

PART TWO

e are now aware of what TRAUMA is and behaviours that may be demonstrated by a child who has been traumatised. This counselling column will further enlighten us on what happens to the physical, mental, emotional, and social aspects of a child's life and how we attempt to treat him/her. I will refer to information presented by the Child's Welfare Information Gateway.

Physical effects of trauma may, in turn, contribute to an inability to control physical responses to stress, which can lead to chronic illnesses even into adulthood, such as heart disease or obesity.

The mental effects of trauma can lead to difficulty in thinking, learning, and concentrating. It can also result in impaired memory and difficulty in switching from one thought or activity to another.

The emotional effects may just be the most damaging of these, as the child suffers with low self-esteem, has many feelings of insecurity, has serious trust issues, which lead to difficulty in maintaining relationships, and later, anxiety and depression.

Lastly, the social behaviours demonstrated can be aggression, isolation, fighting, substance abuse and suicidal tendencies. All of these impact on creating a very aggrieved child.

While children are quite resilient and in many cases their bodies and

minds may recover quickly from a potentially traumatic experience, it is not the same for all. Parenting a traumatised child may require a shift from seeing a "bad child" to seeing a child who has had bad experiences.

As parents, teachers, and caregivers, we need to equip ourselves so that the individual gets the initial help or support.

The following methods can prove most valuable in saving our children from the slippery slope to self-destruction:

- Identify the trauma triggers and help them to avoid the traumatic memories until more healing has occurred.
- Be emotionally and physically available. The traumatised child needs for us to be patient and to follow their lead.
- Respond and not react, lower our voices even when we feel to shout, and avoid staring or glaring. Reassurance and honesty, on our part, will begin to establish trust.



- Do not take the behaviour personally. This is easier said than done. Instead, provide opportunities for open communication.
- Avoid physical punishment at all costs as this can lead to further trauma and panic behaviours.
- Teach relaxation techniques, practice together the art of deep breathing, and repeat positive affirmations such as "I am safe now."
- 7. Listen and listen well, take their reactions seriously, correct misinformation on the traumatic event and firmly let them know it was not their fault. Children have the tendency to feel guilt and shame when bad things occur in their environment.
- Allow some control. There are reasonable, age-appropriate choices that children can be encouraged to make, thus becoming responsible individuals.

Should one still feel ill-equipped to assist with traumatic events in the lives of our children, then a qualified service provider should be sought. It is recommended, however, that as adults we become aware of our own behaviours and take note of the events and situations that can trigger our own negative responses and reactions.

e not anxious or do not worry about anything". This does not mean that we should live life carelessly or live recklessly or throw caution to the wind. In this pandemic, for instance, it does not mean that we should not follow protocols, not wear a mask, not wash hands, not sanitise, not socially distance or do nothing to safeguard ourselves and expect God to do everything! It does not mean that we should not be cautious and concerned about our health, nor be concerned about our future.

We should be careful but not carefree.

At the same time, we should not allow these concerns to preoccupy our minds so much that they consume us and affect our life and living in a negative way. Simply put life is more than the food we eat, the clothes we wear, the car we drive or the house in which we live.

Do not get me wrong – these things do add to the comfort and convenience of life – they are not bad things. We should not give them all up entirely and go live under a rock!

We are all aware that people's livelihoods are affected by the

"lockdown" owing to COVID-19. You would have heard the Government make the point about "lives and livelihood." The question was and is: Can the lives as well as the livelihood of the citizens of our country be secure? It is a reality that some people are living with less but are thankful to be alive. People, in general, are quickly learning to differentiate between their wants as compared to their needs.

This Bible passage reminds us that we can trust God for the necessities of life. Many are concerned about their future. Daily concerns might be job security, mortgage payments, bills, laptops or smart phones for the children to do online studies, grocery bills, the state of the economy – the list can go on and on.

We need to stop somewhere. We need to stop worrying. Some people are so worried, that they are not themselves, not normal, not at peace, not happy, and not living. They are just existing. My advice to all is to handle what is within your control or capability. Make the best of every situation!

Do not worry yourself sick about some of the other issues over which you have no control. This may only lead you to a state of frustration and depression. Bear in mind that we are not the only ones going through this pandemic, the whole world is affected by it and some people live in circumstances even worse than we. So, take it one day at a time and try not to worry too much as this incident illustrates.

A Ship was caught in a turbulent storm. As the crew members made their checks to ensure that everyone on board was all right, they found a little girl in one of the cabins playing alone on the bed. They told her about the storm and asked her, "Are you not worried?"

The girl calmly replied, "No, my father is the Captain and I know everything will be all right."

We, too, have a Heavenly Father and we can trust Him that things will be all right. If He takes care of the birds of the air and other creatures, we can trust Him to take care of our needs.

I love this piece of poetry entitled, "The Robin and the Sparrow."

Said the robin to the sparrow,
Said the robin to the sparrow,
"I should really like to know,
why these anxious human beings
rush about and worry so."
Said the sparrow to the robin,
"Friend, I think that it must be,
that they have no Heavenly Father,
such as cares for you and me."

Scripture states,

"But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you.

34 Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble" (Matt 6: 33 - 34).

To seek as a child of God is to strive after God's will for our lives, being so aware of that strong relationship that we can trust God to provide all that we need. Peace of mind and heart can be ours when we are conscious and committed to One beyond ourselves who cares for us, who promises to supply all our needs.

The Word of God states.

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. 8 For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened" (Matt. 7: 7-8).

s a person who struggles with anxiety, the irony that the Holy Spirit used in Philippians 4:6 to reveal the Living Word to me eleven years ago, does not escape me. Now, amidst the uncertainty and fear that the COVID-19 pandemic brings, the command, "Do not be anxious", can seem very out of touch.

Through the years, this scripture verse has sown itself into my soul and sprouted deep roots. With that, the Spirit has brought deeper understanding. I now feel that Paul, writing from a jail cell, does not attempt to simplify the complexity of anxiety with a command to "just don't be". It does not work that way. Instead, he offers his solution to overcoming.

To me, he is saying, "God Sees. God hears. God knows. So, pray about it. Be honest about it. Lament about it. Be broken about it before God. And then, trust in who God is." The scripture continues into verse 7,

"And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

I can only speak from my experience when I say that a brief moment of connecting with God does not maintain this peace. It involves constant conversations, constant surrendering, constant trusting. It involves relationship; and the storms do not go away. Instead, there is a knowing that I am being held while the winds are blasting, and the rains are so heavy that I cannot see what is ahead.

In the battles, I feel guarded.
Amidst the chaos and uncertainty, the peace comes. It comes while I am 'vibing' with God on the way to work. It is in the voice of a loved one encouraging me on the other end of a phone call. It comes through the message I receive in the middle of a shift from a member of my faith community, just to let me know they are praying for me. I find it in the counsel of mental health professionals who have been blessed with the gift to heal our minds.

The peace comes in knowing that I am trying to do what I can where God has planted me.

It is my prayer that those searching for peace amid anxiety will find it. Remember, God sees, God hears, God knows. So, reach out. You are not alone. You are loved.

Bhajans or songs of praise to God which were translated from English to Hindi/Bhojpuri so that early Indian immigrants could understand the Word of God in music.

Our Bhajan singers sang fluently in Hindi. Elder Nadia Mitchell began with "Yishu Ke Piche Mein Chalnay Laaga" (I have decided to follow Jesus) which was stirring and emotional. The singing was elevated by the mother-daughter

duo, Kavita and Cheryl Buthapati, who are originally from India.
They serenaded the group with a medley, "Yisu ne kaha, Jewan ki Roti" (Jesus is the Bread of Life), "Yishu Karta, Mujhe Pyar" (Jesus loves me this I know) and "Yishu Masih". The attendees were also blessed with "The Lord's Prayer" in Hindi, as Linda Sammy shared her learning with the group.

As part of the focus on the rich heritage of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT), Presiding Elder Mr. Kenrick Seepersad shared some of the early history of how the Canadian Mission ministered to the East Indian immigrants using education as a powerful tool.

Reverend Annabell Lalla-Ramkelawan lifted the group with a message and prayers for well-being and health. Following the session, the organiser and hostess, Ms. Sharmila Singh, received on behalf of the Group, several messages of gratitude especially from the ill, the bed-ridden participants and those who have lost loved ones...





any of our readers pointed out that the June issue of The Trinidad Presbyterian carried an incorrect photo of the Aramalaya Presbyterian Church Building on page 22. For this we sincerely apologise and make restitution by publishing the correct photo in this month's edition.

The photo that was used last month was a photo of the Morton House Spiritual Life Enrichment Centre which is one of three manses on the Aramalaya Compound in Tunapuna. In 1996, this Missionary Manse, which is more popularly known as Morton House, was converted to a Convention and Retreat Centre with accommodation for up to four dozen persons.

This building was the home of The Reverend Dr. John Morton and his family from when it was built in 1881 until well into the 1940s. Indeed. Morton House is the oldest structure owned by the PCTT. The nearby Catechist House which faces the Aramalaya Church is the second oldest. The Aramalaya congregation was founded just 13 years after the congregation at Iere Village and is the oldest in North Trinidad. The present church building was constructed in 1980/81. The Bell Tower, at the front, houses the Morton Ministerial Jubilee Bell which was cast from melted US Civil War cannon in 1911 in the State of New York. USA. It was a gift to the Mortons in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of Rev. Morton's ordination in 1912.

On the morning of Sunday 4th August 1912, just a few months after it was installed, Reverend Dr. Morton passed away in his bedroom just as this bell was ringing to call the faithful to Sunday morning worship. It tolled the following day for his funeral. Rev. Morton's bedroom can still be visited today and can be seen on the first floor to the right of the bell tower in the photo.

The Aramalaya compound is also known as the birthplace of Hillview College and, in 1904, the first copy of The Trinidad Presbyterian was produced there. It is rumoured that the original press which was the first printing press in the Western Hemisphere to print Hindi text is buried somewhere on the compound.

The congregation is also the home congregation of the first local female minister The Reverend Mary Naimool and in the 1960s the young people of Aramalaya became the first in our Church to play steelpan.


s no two snowflakes are alike, so too are no two children alike. In today's society, the term "differently abled" is often heard when it comes to the education environment. This term briefly

Statement from the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT)

he PCTT, through the Primary and Secondary Schools' Boards of Education, is responsible for the management and administration of seventy-two (72) Primary and five (5) Secondary Schools. In carrying out these responsibilities, our Church and Boards of Education are at all times guided by the provisions of The Constitution of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago, The Education Act, The Teaching Service Regulations, The Public Service Regulations as adopted by The Teaching Service and all other relevant legal provisions that govern our Education System. The Church and Boards of Education also adhere to the provisions of The Concordat and the policies developed and designed by the Ministry of Education (MOE) for the effective functioning of schools.

The positive tone, ethos, discipline, culture, and climate of our schools have evolved over decades due to the hard work, commitment, diligence, professionalism and aim for excellence from our educators. students, parents, and other stakeholders in partnership. When the last Academic Performance Index was issued in 2016, less than five percent (5%) of our schools were listed under Academic Watch. Many of our Primary Schools, on an annual basis, receive as many as four (4) and five (5) times the number of applications for admission when compared to the number of First Year spaces available. The high demand for places in almost all our Primary Schools is due to the performance of these schools in the academic, sporting, and cultural fields, which are steeped in excellence.

Admissions to our seventy-two (72) Primary Schools are based solely on the criteria and policies set out be the MOE which include age, immunization status, and residence in the catchment area, among others. It must be emphasized that all admissions to Presbyterian Primary Schools are based on the MOE's criteria. The Church has made no intervention in this regard and has never indicated that race and ethnicity must be used by Principals in their selection of students. No child has ever been denied admission based on religion or ethnicity nor is there evidence to suggest any pattern of bias over the decades of the existence of our Schools.

In our Secondary Schools, by virtue of the Concordat which governs all denominational schools' eighty percent (80%) of Form 1 placement is based on the MOE's system out of the results of the Secondary Entrance Assessment (formerly the Common Entrance Examination). The remaining twenty percent (20%) intake is then allocated for selection by the Principals of each of our five (5) Secondary Schools (which is on average twenty-one (21) students annually). As part of the Concordat, these places were allocated to the denominational bodies to make provision for students belonging to the respective faiths in Trinidad and Tobago.

With respect to the PCTT, these selections by our Principals are guided by a rigid criterion based on recommendations from our twenty-four (24) Pastoral Regions. The fact that our schools are often listed as 1st choice for thousands of students is testament to our legacy of excellence in Education at the Secondary Level and the focus on spirituality, morality, values education, and the holistic development of our students. Our Secondary Schools have produced not only scholars par excellence, but also national leaders, sportsmen, cultural and musical icons who have made indelible marks both nationally and on the world stage.

The origins of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago are from a Canadian Mission to the Indian diaspora post-Indentureship, and, as such, many of our schools and churches are located in former farming communities in rural south and central Trinidad, the demographics of which are predominantly Indo-Trinidadians. Despite this, our Secondary Schools have the proud history of being non-discriminatory to any race, ethnicity, or religion and are privileged and blessed to be the 1st choice school for many high

achievers at the SEA examinations. We have never interfered with the MOE's selection process.

All students in our Secondary Schools are offered the same educational opportunities and many have reached their full potential as a result of the stewardship of generations of members and other stakeholders. It was, therefore, deeply disappointing and disturbing to see baseless and misleading insinuations made in a recent opinion editorial which must be vehemently denied. The PCTT and its Boards of Education, along with our Principals and Teachers, wish to reassure all stakeholders that despite the extraordinary times of the COVID-19 pandemic we shall continue to work in the Nation's interest by continuing to promote excellence in and ensuring "Every Creed and Race find an Equal place."

Why is this a common occurrence? Countries on the whole are governed by the interaction between government and opposition. To this end, decision making is usually geared towards the survival of the party in power and a quest by the opposition to return to the seat of government. Herein lies the problem. In this constant battle for political supremacy many of the burning issues of the day fall by the wayside. This is demonstrated by the manner in which State-run institutions are given birth.

It is the general rule of practice that party loyalists are rewarded with key positions in State enterprises. It has clearly been shown that the failure of successive governments to appoint competent persons has led to serious financial losses at the expense of the taxpayers and the delivery of poor-quality service. Such a situation redounds mostly to the detriment of the poor and the marginalised.

In our present circumstance after six decades of independence, blessed with abundant oil and gas, our performance as a country leaves a lot to be desired.

It is acceptable that governments should appoint their own people but what is clearly an affront to the population is the quality of leadership provided by these appointees. Over the years, we have seen a deterioration of our institutions and a clear lack of transparency amidst deep concerns of corruption. No one will disagree, regardless of party

affiliation, that our petrol dollars were badly managed.

The present pandemic has brought this into the full glare of the public.

Therefore, in an effort to take advantage of our present crisis, the question of leadership in all walks of life must and should be seriously addressed. The effects of this pandemic have clearly changed the way that things should be done. The real question now is when all of this is said and done would the new normal relating to leadership revert to the old normal of patronage?

This is the billion-dollar question.

The Church is the moral voice of the people and must speak truth to power. It must also prevail on the government of the day to always speak truth to the people.

isasters can strike at any time - hurricanes, earthquakes, volcanic activity, landslides, infectious disease - the question is, Are You Ready? Too often in Trinidad we take for granted the severity of disasters and impact they can have on our daily lives. Since 2020 we have been trying to adapt to the "new normal" of the COVID-19 disease. With June 1st marking the start of the Atlantic Hurricane Season, there is no better time to be prepared than now.

Trinidad & Tobago has not been spared any impact of hazards. Since 2017 we have seen the growth in torrential rainfall and flooding, but these are not the only major events that can affect us. We are also vulnerable to industrial accidents. wildfires, tsunamis, landslides, earthquakes, and volcanic activity, just to name a few.

As a household, being prepared is the first step in responding to any emergencies. Having a family plan on what to do when an incident takes place can help. This plan can entail where to go (if not at home and an incident takes place), who to contact in an emergency or how to safely evacuate your home in an emergency.

A simple Grab and Go kit for each household is advised, stocking basic items as suggested: *First Aid Supplies *Non-Prescription and Prescription Medication *Sanitation and Hygiene Supplies *Equipment and Tools *Water and Food for at least 3 days*Clothing and Bedding *Documents and Keys

These items should be kept in a waterproof container or large bag and kept in a cool dry place. Also, its location should be known by each member of the household.

This is just a basic suggestion for preparedness and will be different depending on each household's needs and size.

BIBLE STORY

Paul Learned about Jesus (Acts 9:1-20)

Even if I am able to trust in myself, still I do not. If anyone thinks that he has a reason to trust in himself, he should know that I have greater reason for trusting in myself. I was circumcised eight days after my birth. I am from the people of Israel and the tribe of Benjamin. I am a Hebrew, and my parents were Hebrews. The law of Moses was very important to me. That is why I became a Pharisee. I was so enthusiastic that I tried to hurt the church. No one could find fault with the way I obeyed the law of Moses. At one time, all these things were important to me. But now I think those things are worth nothing because of Christ. Not only those things, but I think that all things are worth nothing compared with the greatness of knowing Christ Jesus, my Lord. Because of Christ, I have lost all those things. And now I know that all those things are worthless trash. This allows me to have Christ and to belong to him. Now that I belong to Christ, I am right with God and this being right does not come from my following the law. It comes from God through faith. God uses my faith in Christ to make me right with him.

MESSAGE

Paul was someone who was extremely smart. As a Pharisee, Paul would have memorised, known, and followed the 613 laws on how to follow God. He was someone who was 100% about following God. When he believed that Jesus was not God's son, he used his energy and time to go after the early Christians, dragging them to court to face death. He was determined that God should be honoured.

Last month we learnt about how Jesus changed Paul's life and how Paul spent his whole life working to make Jesus known.

Paul reached many people who had never heard of Jesus. With FAITH, Paul travelled to non-Jewish countries, believing that God would be with him and used his travel to make many more Christians. With HOPE, Paul knew that the work he was doing was bigger than himself. With LOVE, Paul paid for his travel by sewing tents instead of asking other people for money. Thanks to his work with God, many of us are Christians today.

God seeks to have a relationship with us and for us to work with Him! There are three special ingredients

that will help us learn how to work with God. The three ingredients are: Faith, Hope, and Love.

Faith. When you work with faith, you believe that God wants to be a part of what you're doing, and you believe that his presence in your work makes a difference.

Believing these things is working with faith.

Hope. When you work with hope, you know that God can do surprisingly big things through your work. Your work is like a small seed - God can use your work to touch more people than you might expect, or make other things happen that you might not expect. Working with hope means that you don't limit how you see people and situations you are working with - you leave room for God.

Love. When you work with love, you do the task with all your heart. Even if it's a simple task like washing dishes. By working with love, you work to serve others as God would, bringing his attitude, work ethic, and care into whatever you do.

When you work with faith, hope, and love, you're not just working for God, you are working with God. You and God are partners in work.

These gifts of God work together, each helps and supports the other. Faith in God helps hope to grow, and faith and hope help overcome fears. Then we become free to let God's love flow through us to others.
