Moderator speaks

WOMEN: BREAKING CHAINS, NURTURING COMMUNITY, Planting seeds of hope

he Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) joins the world in celebrating International Women's Day on 08 March 2022. There will be activities throughout the month. This is an opportunity for us to celebrate the courage, determination and contribution of women and girls.

This year, the PCTT has been invited by one of its ecumenical partners, the Council for World Mission (CWM) Caribbean and European Regions' Gender Justice Group, to lead in a Webinar. The theme for the Webinar is, "Women – Breaking Chains, Nurturing Community, *Planting Seeds of Hope*". This theme embraces the United Nations theme, "Gender equality today for a sustainable tomorrow". Both themes recognize the contribution of women and girls around the world who are leading the charge on climate change and mitigation to build a more sustainable future for all.

However, it pains me to note that even as we observe this important event criminal violence against women continues in our country. This leads us to question whether another panel discussion or webinar on gender justice makes any difference. Would lecturing to families and youths make any difference? Or would the intervention of the school, church, community or prison make a difference?

The global COVID-19 Pandemic has already brought grief and distress to families who lost loved ones. Some families were literally wiped out by this pandemic. And now to add to this distressing situation families are violently robbed even in the sanctity of their own homes. It is now a sad reality that most of these crimes are associated with gangs heavily involved in drugs, illegal guns, corruption and human trafficking. Domestic abuse is also on the increase. But what is more alarming is that criminal offenders have crossed the barriers of age and gender.

How many more times must our eyes be filled with tears of anger, despair, sadness and compassion at the news of avoidable death? How many more times must we condemn the evil perpetrated on our vulnerable? How many more times will we allow these things to pass through the 24-hour news cycle and then forgotten? The fear is that this continuous violence against women and law-abiding citizens may, if not curbed, can very well define the character of our society.

It is easy to point to a particular societal failure but that is equivalent

to losing sight of the forest through the trees. It is futile to expect any one institution to solve this problem of violence. We need an effective partnership among all institutions. The situation demands that both women and men challenge stereotypes, fight bias, broaden our perceptions, and make interventions to improve relationships.

As we observe International Women's Day 2022, the PCTT is charged with the responsibility to challenge violence, in all its forms and to call out those who seek to overpower the powerless and the weak. Non-violence should become a way of life. It should be a catalyst in the formation of a system of personal and social change based upon the power of God's love. And to use that power of love to overcome evil, to obtain justice, peace and reconciliation for all.

Our call to protect women and girls is firmly rooted in the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ who reaffirmed the personhood of women, empowering them to a life of dignity and wholesomeness. May God bless us all as we seek to end violence in all forms, breaking chains, nurturing community and planting seeds of hope for a more sustainable future for all!

How Can I Serve My Church & Congregation

ow many of us have questioned silently why for over decades, some worshippers mark off Congregational Meeting in their mind's calendar as a day to take off from Sunday Morning Church Service or why they do not accept a post in one of the groups in the church? The answer varies according to whom you speak. The responses include such qualities as commitment, responsibility, convenience, and competence or the lack thereof.

The *Cambridge English Dictionary* defines the following terms: **COMMITMENT**: willingness to give your time and energy to a job, activity, or something that you believe in. **RESPONSIBILITY**: to have control and authority over something or someone and the duty of taking care of it, him or her. **CONVENIENT**: suitable for your purposes and causing no difficulty for your schedule or plans. **COMPETENCE**: the ability to do something well.

The excuses for not being present in church for Congregation Meeting or accepting to serve in a group are varied as are the excuses for declining nominations, but how many pray before the meeting asking God for His guidance. Proverbs 3: 5 – 6 tell us, "*Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.*" Many worshippers do not want to accept responsibilities, they express a desire to 'just' come to church, give an offering but do not want to deal with church matters, they do not want to participate in the work of the church, nor do they want the responsibility of being part of the decision making body.

Others can list why they do not want to get involved: they do not want to say 'no' if nominated, the time of church service is not convenient to them so they will attend when they can or when the time of service is changed, they will make a commitment to serve when the time is right, the unwillingness to give of their time as they consider it too costly to serve the church, they do not need anything from the church, they just come for spiritual nourishment, and some never give becoming involved a second thought.

Among those who choose not to serve are those who fear the name calling and the stigma attached to certain offices especially when it comes to finances, and those who want to stand on the side-lines and criticize the ones who have made a commitment to serve.

Yet, others are reluctant to serve because they think they will not be selected to serve because of what they see as a monopoly by certain families. They, therefore, feel they have nothing to offer, they fail to identify the gift or talent bestowed on them and acknowledge that they can build on that gift, "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Corinthian 12:7, NRSV).

If your Congregation Meeting for 2022 has passed and group elections have taken place, start seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit to lead you in the direction in which you can be of service to your church now or at the next Congregation Meeting.

The individual worshipper has, through introspection, to determine the area he or she is capable of serving his fellowman. He or she has to seek the Holy Spirit's guidance as to the course he or she should direct his or her service.

Let us not be like Jeremiah in the Book of Jeremiah, Chapter 1, vs. 6ff, whose first thought was to make an excuse not to answer God's call, "*Ah, Lord GOD! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy.*"

The Lord answered him, "Do not say, 'I am only a boy'; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you." Let us not doubt ourselves and our ability to be of service, but have faith that God would lead us as he did Jeremiah. he Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) is elated with the delayed announcement of the National Awards for 2021 by the Office of the President of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. The Church applauds the award of the National Medal for Women Development - Gold to the Rt. Reverend Joy Abdul-Mohan, present Moderator of the PCTT, a Minister of deep faith and loyalty and a woman of substance.

This is only the second time a member of the Clergy of the PCTT has received a National Award for service.

This award for the Development of Women comes coincidentally at a time when the whole world including the Christian Church are celebrating International Women's Day, held on 8th March and the annual recognition of women and their significant contributions globally.

The PCTT congratulates Rev. Abdul-Mohan on this auspicious award, which brings to the attention of the nation what our Church has known for many years about The Rt. Reverend Abdul-Mohan - her life of service to God and country, and one of focus on the development of women and the education of girls.

The Rt. Reverend Abdul-Mohan, during her 33 years as an Ordained Minister, has spread the Word of God with compassion, and has led the Church with humility, dignity and integrity. Her role in keeping alive issues of women in general, and issues of gender-based violence and domestic violence in particular, within the Church and in the wider community and country, is quite a vocation in pastoral care and activism.

The Rt. Reverend Abdul-Mohan holds a Master of Arts, Princeton Theological Seminary and pursued Higher Education in Law, University of London and in Mediation and looks forward to becoming a Certified Mediator. She is at present pursuing a BA in Childhood Education. Besides being an academic, other personal milestones in her career illustrate the development of women - being the first Locally Ordained Female Minister of the PCTT, also the youngest Ordained Minister at age 23, and the first Female Principal of the St. Andrew's Theological College, the seminary of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago. The Rt. Reverend

Abdul-Mohan has also served as an Independent Senator in the 10th Parliament of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. She works assiduously with the Rapidfire Kidz Foundation on which she serves as the Vice President of the Foundation for the past ten (10).

The Reverend Abdul-Mohan is a role model and inspiration to girls and women in general. Her work ethic and infectious energy emulates the Bible Women of the Church's history in creating a legacy of her own. We are certain that somewhere out there, a little girl, a young woman, will be inspired by Rt. Reverend Joy Abdul-Mohan, to serve God and country and to have a voice for women in general.

The PCTT is thankful for the work of this servant-leader as she continues her work for the development of the Church and of Women. The Church celebrates her successes and the recognition of Rt. Reverend Abdul-Mohan as an exemplar of selfless commitment in a life-long vocation of love and compassion.

part two: independent *LEARNERS AT HOME*

COUNSELLING COLUMN WITH BERNADETTE GYAN-MANICKCHAND

How can parents/guardians promote an independent learner at home?

s virtual schooling continues for many of our students, our role in developing independent learners becomes more emphatic.

Part one of the column offered and discussed three main strategies: creative-exploration, a home-work routine and the "guide at the side" aspects.

We will now explore other techniques that would be beneficial to our school-aged charges. Cognitive Psychology allows us as adults to be practical so that the child sees and understands how learning works.

Firstly, we encourage a sense of purpose. If students care about what they are learning and why they are doing so they make a greater effort in getting the task completed. Some children are coerced into studies because they would be graded or marked, some because they are told it is expected of them, and some are told of the benefits in their career path. If students can identify how the material will help them or what skills they will develop as a result, it will increase their engagement levels. Understanding our children's needs should be one of our responsibilities towards them.

The next aspect we look at is to focus on mastery and not comparison with others. (Personally I have found online learning facilitated this, as the student did not compete with his/her classmates as when they meet in the physical classroom). Research has shown that students who compare themselves to others tend to have lower levels of motivation, confidence, self-regulation, academic performance and increased anxiety. Parents can help encourage their children to develop a mastery orientation by having students measure themselves

against their previous efforts, focus on 'improving themselves rather than proving themselves' and actively reflecting on what they have learnt from their experiences.

This third aspect has been most challenging though seemingly simple. Distractions! We, as adults, have all suffered from completing tasks due to distractions. To ensure independence takes place, we need to remove them. Remove cell phones, turn off the television, lower our own volume and keep the curtains drawn from nosey neighbours.

Research shows that the ability to improve concentration and attention is something that can be developed, even from a very young age.

In concluding, I would suggest that in setting the stage or the development of independent learners we too must take the initiative and not leave it up to the teachers as they are no longer present once the computer is shutdown.



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WE ARE DUST & TO DUST WE SHALL RETURN

n some churches, the palm branches used for the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations are burned and the ashes placed on the foreheads of worshippers with the solemn intonation of the words of Genesis 3:19 to remember that we are dust and to dust we shall return.

Let's think about this:

- 1. **REMEMBER**: When we remember where we came from, we remember that we are formed out of the particles of the earth. We are integral components of the earth so we should care for each other and the environment; the fabric of the earth forms our frame.
- 2. DUST: The lowliest item of the earth constitutes our composition. We are not made out of "gold dust" or "fairy dust" but out of the simple, earthy dirt that is the elemental beginning of all construction and generation.
- 3. DIVINE: The dust is our bodily composition but not our spiritual character. We are infused with the divine breath that animates us and exalts us. Only when God breathes into the dust do we have life.

4. RETURN BUT NOT REMAIN:

We shall return to the dust. Our bodies are like temporary tents (2 Corinthians 5: 1-10) and shall return to the fibres of the universe. However, although the dust returns to the ground of its origin, the soul returns to the Lord (Ecclesiastes 12:7). We are assured of the immortality of the soul and the resurrection of the body (Philippians 1:20-23; 1 Corinthians 15).

Whether or not we put something physically symbolic on our forehead, our souls are emblazoned with the insignia of Christ.

We accept and transcend our earthly bodies in the journey of life which is mirrored in the journey of Lent from the dust of Ash Wednesday to the bitter Cross of Good Friday and then the risen Saviour of Easter.



CRISIS IN THE FAMILY: COUPLES

PART 3: ATTACHMENT AND BONDING

Having defined the crises of couples as 'the consequences and outcomes of an unending list of dynamics' [Part 2], let's focus on the crisis of Attachment and Bonding. Mary Ainsworth (1973) defines attachment as 'an affectional tie that one person forms to another specific person, binding them together in space and enduring over time.'

When couples begin a relationship, they hope that attachment and bonding will give a sense of belongingness. However, the attachment relationship that couples form can be either secure, based on trust, or insecure based on distrust which can impact their relationship and sense of self-worth like that of an infant to a parent or caregiver.

Truth, trust and love usually are the glue holding their relationship but should the glue deteriorate, the bonding and attachment weaken. Sadly, couples become detached and drift apart into social distancing [as per COVID-19 protocol] with their physical-sexual, emotional, psychological, financial and communicational interactions affected. Separation leads to divorce, rarely on good terms but often marinated with resentment, anger, hatred ... with abuse, violence and death by grief or murder. What then can explain the 'unsticking' or detachment of the couple, the proclaimed soulmates and their loss of intimacy and bonding and all that was love?

To keep the sense of belonging together and to maintain the bond of love and person for person attachment, their relationship cannot take each other for granted or attempt to forcibly effect change to suit their desired image or likeness. A couple despite their attachment and bonding remains as two distinct and identifiable persons 'as they had begun.' Whatever attracted them into becoming a couple and whatever their marital status, they should be mindful that a true relationship is not a 50:50 divide but a relationship where each is there for the other with care, kindness, love and forgiveness, personal trusted interest and genuine concern.

Belonging is never to be mistaken or understood as ownership. Love and belongingness are not one directional but similar to a handshake, a hug, a full open embrace, a smile reciprocating an open heart with the compassion and passion. Couples cannot live parallel lives. Belonging joins and strengthens the couple to provide for each other the needed assistance and support and be a second opinion in times of challenges and conflicts.

Couples are central to family and can resolve crises, remove hurt and pain and heal lovingly but the onus is with each to understand and appreciate the strengths and weaknesses of their attachment and bonding. This is necessary for a couple as each becomes a caregiver to the other.

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Never let it ever be that the couple in the family can NOT adjust and adapt as changes occur.

Couples Crisis will continue.

Be Not Anxious About The Future.

he Apostle Paul gives the advice in Philippians 4:6: "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God."

ASH WEDNESDAY SPECIAL

INGREDIENTS 1 pkt. macaroni noodles 1 tin corn beef 1 large onion thinly sliced 1 egg 1/4 cup ketchup salt and pepper to taste 1/2 lb grated cheese

METHOD

Boil macaroni in boiling water until cooked. Grease pie dish with margarine. Mix macaroni with all other ingredients including corned beef which has been flaked, leaving cheese for the last. Place mixture into baking dish, add grated cheese on top. Place in pre-heated oven for 30 minutes at 375 degrees F. Serve hot or cold.

BACHANNAL BAKE

INGREDIENTS 1 lb flour 1 tsp. sugar 1 tsp salt 4 tsp. baking powder 2 tbsp margarine 1 1/2 tbsps cookeen 2 cups grated coconut 1 1/2 cup water

METHOD

Add water to grated coconut and mix. Squeeze out coconut milk and reserve. Sift flour, salt, sugar and baking powder into bowl. Add cookeen and margarine and work into flour until it looks like fine bread crumbs. Add coconut into flour to make a soft dough. Knead lightly to form a smooth ball. Roll out on floured board to form a round bake. Place in pan in a preheated oven at 375 degrees for 20 mins.



World Day of Prayer 2022

'I KNOW THE PLANS I HAVE FOR YOU' JEREMIAH 29:1-14



orld Day of Prayer (WDP) 2022 takes place on Friday 4th March, 2022 and is prepared by the WDP team in England, Wales and Northern Ireland (EWNI).

The program is based on the letter that the prophet Jeremiah wrote to the exiles in Babylonia. The exiles were in a context of suffering, uncertainty, and opposing views on how to respond to the moment. In the midst of all the uncertainties we are living under due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the WDP 2022 theme is a balm of confidence. It is an invitation to place our trust in God in times of suffering.

World Day of Prayer is an international ecumenical organisation which enables women all over the world to share the ideas and concerns of the writing country. The EWNI WDP National Committee includes 18 different Christian denominations.

"It has been both challenging and rewarding to write about the three countries that make up our area: our landscape, people and culture all shaped by our history. We celebrate our diversity and the contribution made to our countries by the many groups and individuals who have made their home here. We use our Bible text: "I know the plans I have for you," from Jeremiah to reflect on some of the issues facing us today: poverty, domestic abuse and disability, finding hope in difficult situations and encouragement in the help we can give to each other." EWNI National Committee.

Through the service worshippers will hear the stories of women who feel excluded, listen to the fear of a child refugee and learn to see the context of a multi-ethnic, multi-cultural, and multi-faith society in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

THE WDP 2022 ARTWORK

The artwork, created by Angie Fox using a combination of embroidery, appliqué and metalwork, depicts key words such as, Freedom, represented as an open door to a pathway across an endless open vista; Justice, represented by broken chains; God's Peace and Forgiveness, represented by the dove of peace and a peace lily breaking through the pavement.

Over all, a rainbow which has come to represent all these things from the story of Noah through to the modern day. It is a symbol of the overreaching love of God.

he Bible does not provide us with a definition of Sacrament. The word Sacrament is derived from the Latin sacramentum which in turn translates the Greek Mysterion, "mystery." Sacraments are practices of the Church which are considered to be sacred. Sacraments are holy practices of the Church based on scriptural authority and empowered by the Spirit of God as a "means of grace" to affirm the presence and promise of Christ to the believer. Sacraments are "visible words," and "embodiment of grace enacted testimonies to the love of God in Jesus Christ." 1

The Westminster Shorter Catechism offers us a more precise definition: a Sacrament is "a holy ordinance instituted by Christ wherein by visible signs Christ and the benefits of the new covenant are represented, sealed, and applied to believers."² Sacraments are tangible enactments of the gospel by which God's Spirit affirms to the believing community the forgiving, renewing, and promised love of God in Jesus Christ and arouses in the believer faith, hope and love.

Just as the Bible does not give us a definition of a Sacrament, in like manner, it does not stipulate a number. Religious denominations often differ in the definition and number of Sacraments that they observe. Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches, since the thirteenth century, set their Sacrament number as seven: baptism, confirmation, Eucharist, penance, ordination, marriage and anointing of the sick. The Reformed Churches, on the other hand, observe two Sacraments: Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The Reformers' argument for this move was: Sacraments were to be limited to practices instituted by Christ and the apostles.

In his Institutes, John Calvin describes a Sacrament as "an outward sign by which the Lord seals on our consciences the promises of his good will toward us in order to sustain the weakness of our faith; and we in turn attest our piety toward him in the presence of the Lord and of his angels and before men." ³ St. Augustine defines a Sacrament as "an outward and visible sign of an inward and invisible grace." ⁴



A Season of Preparation

he New Testament gives an account of Jesus, being led by the Holy Spirit, retreating to the wilderness to fast for forty days. This occurred after His Baptism when the Holy Spirit descended upon Him, and God the Father said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

Jesus, being fully God but fully man, would have experienced human weakness after fasting for so long. 2 Corinthians 12: 9-10 tells us that when we are weak, then, we are strong. God's grace is sufficient for us, and His Power is made perfect in our weaknesses. Since Jesus was fully man, He would have been now fully dependent on strength coming from His Heavenly Father at this time. In the beginning, God (Elohim) created the heavens and the earth (Genesis 1:1). "Elohim" is a Hebrew Name for God, meaning "Strength" or "Power". Throughout the Bible, God promises His Strength to His People. Jesus was dependent on God, (Isaiah 40:26), who upholds the stars with His Hands to strengthen Him so that He could be ready to fulfill His Divine Mission.


YELLOW JELLYBEAN


