

How does one select a learning institution for an early childhood education?

indergartens, today, have come a long way from day-care and nursery schools. Parents, presently, seek out the most secure institution that provides comfort as well as the most advanced curriculum that suits their pocket. This would ensure that there would be a smooth and sunny introduction to further schooling as the stage is set for life-long learning.

Decades ago, when mothers and grandmothers provided all round nurturing for babies and toddlers, there was little or no need for the competition that exists today in attracting parents to schools/ establishments. Rising cost of living as well as independent living has made parents into customers for pre-schools. What is to be considered then, when selecting the best for pre-schoolers?

Many early childhood learning establishments are labelled as 'academies', and pre-schoolers graduate in cap and gowns winning prestigious awards. There are brochures extolling their strengths explaining their aims and objectives. Parents can be overwhelmed at the task of selecting a most popular nursery or kindergarten.

Most parents expect high standards of efficiency in the running of the institution as well as good practice in the care and education of the child. Some may also expect to be able to communicate with the staff on any subject whenever they wish, and this may not always prove to be possible. Those with a clear "open door" policy will, therefore, be one that is high on the list. Especially as there is separation between parent and child for the first time.

This exercise need not be a stressful one if we take a practical approach. First, consider the main goal of a good kindergarten program and ponder. Will my child be provided with an opportunity to grow and develop in a holistic way so that he/she will be able to practice the essential moral, social, emotional, problem-solving and study skills that he/she will use throughout his/ her schooling experience?

Parents/guardian can also note the following: details of the governing body or management committee, parental responsibilities and involvement, support staff, policies regarding attendance, treatment of sudden illness, organization and equipment, collection procedures and fund-raising activities.

Partnering with your child's first place of learning is the first step to achieving all round success for everyone.

ent yields to Easter with cyclical predictability, but celebrating the resurrection can be challenging in a world recoiling from the ominous effects of war, devastation and plague.

However, it is precisely because of the fallen state of our world that we are an Easter people. When we sing, "Thine be the glory, Risen, Conquering Son" or "Now the green blade rises" we proclaim the reality of inevitable divine triumph in the face of unrelenting earthly tragedy.

We live in a Good Friday world. We understand people who are subjected to suffering by merciless tyrants. We understand deception, betrayal and cruelty. We understand death. Easter gives us what we do not understand. The stone that is rolled away presents to us an empty tomb. We seek memorials and material monuments and instead the angel speaks to us with a statement that is paradoxically both reassuring and disturbing - that the One we are looking for is not here, but risen and going ahead of us. When we think we have a dead Jesus in a fixed location, we have a living Christ moving faster than we are.

The Latin epitaph for the great architect Christopher Wren is "Si monumentum requires, circumspice" which can be translated as "If you need to see my monument, look around you." The crypt, church and many buildings around London and within England were designed by Wren. Viewers looking around would appreciate that Wren built the world in which they were standing.

Jesus is alive. No epitaphs are required. We are the moving monuments determined to follow where Jesus is leading us. In this Easter season and always, let us live so that if people want to see Jesus, they can perceive the power of his living presence in us.

PART 4: ROMANTIC OR DOMESTIC?

aving defined the crises of couples as 'the consequences and outcomes of an unending list of dynamics,' [Part 2] let's focus on the crisis of Romantic and Domestic.

Is there a balance between the romantic and domestic relationship or the romantic vs domestic? This is often the crises of couples as they navigate everyday life and situations from the time of meeting through courting to setting up house. Education, career and work; children and family; religious and social activities and personal psycho-social development impact through their stages of life.

The duties, responsibilities, challenges and demands of chores and interests affect the romantic and domestic as well as your sanity. With fear, anger, indifference or separation, another relationship, the cycle continues. If you fail to manage you would manage to fail.

What is the resolve? Talk, communicate, share. What is your strategy? Strategically plan your relationship even though you both may not always follow the plan. Be open, willing, trusting, forgiving to the other and yourself. When you may not have the answer or capacity to navigate, do not fear to turn to others for help, encouragement and assurance. Do not befriend or become victim of those who find pleasure in your misery, pain and agony. Do not pretend to care, do not FAKE it, it will catch up with you. You know your partner well. It is said, "The way to a man's heart is through his stomach." Sadly, too many men and women cannot stomach what is served on the plates of pretence, dishonesty and disillusion. The result - difficulty or failure to reach the heart.

Associated with the emotions and affections. love and the heart is Romance. What is romance? Is not the way you feel and think drive of all your senses? *Romance is defined* as a love affair, an atmosphere or feeling ... to build 'castles in the air.' For some, it is the expressions (true or fake) that leads to intimacy and pleasure. Romance is more than momentary and should be considered and practiced as a way of life, with interactions and display of 'open' affection to/with each other. Romance should be genuine, unconditional and true

whether play or flirting. It is the little daily and momentary exchanges and interactions that waters and nourishes your relationship as a couple.

A Journey of Faith At Tableland

n Easter Sunday, the congregation of St. James Presbyterian Church in Tableland will hold a thanksgiving service to mark three milestones in the life of the Presbyterian community there. The Moderator of Synod, the Rt. Reverend Joy Abdul-Mohan, will be there to bring a message of faith and hope.

The three milestones are: the 138th Anniversary of the Presbyterian presence in Tableland; the 100th Anniversary of the dedication of the first church building; and the 34th Anniversary of the present church building.


A small group of former indentured East Indian labourers who now owned land in Tableland established a preaching point at Elswick Village (now George Village) with the blessings of Reverend John Morton. This was in 1884. This preaching point was recognised as a Mission Station when it was re-located to Tableland. Thirty-eight years later a church was constructed. That first church was a wooden building dedicated by Canadian Missionary, Reverend W. A. Hunter, the then Moderator of the Presbytery of Trinidad on Good Friday, 14th April, 1922. The construction project was spearheaded by then catechist, Thomas Ali Hosein. That building was completed at a cost of \$2,085.

The second church building was dedicated by the then Moderator of Synod, the Rt Reverend Everson T. Sieunarine, on 24th April, 1988. The construction project was spearheaded by then schoolteacher, Dave Puntai. It was completed at a cost of \$120,000.

Emerging out of the Presbyterian community were two primary schools – the Elswick Presbyterian School and the Nipal Presbyterian School. These two schools were the only educational institutions serving all the children of Tableland and George Village for some 80 years. Out of these two schools came many persons who held influential positions in the national community in education, politics, the private sector, labour and the civil service.

The service of Thanksgiving is scheduled for Easter Sunday, 17th April, 2022, at 9.00 a.m. A 160-page book on the historical journey of the St. James Presbyterian Church will be launched.

SACRAMEN AL INSIGHTS THE INSTITUTION OF BAPTISM

he moment we speak about the Institution of Baptism, we think immediately about Jesus' command to His disciples:

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matt.28:19- 20 NRSV).

The importance of this passage to the Baptismal practice of the Church cannot be denied. However, the Baptismal practice of the Church is not only based on this command of Jesus.

The Baptismal practice of the Church is also based on the act of Jesus when, without reservation, He surrendered Himself to Baptism. Karl Bath, a Reformed theologian, describes the act of Jesus' baptism

as "a prologue which opens and characterizes the whole of the gospel drama that concludes with the passion." The obedient submission of Jesus to be baptized by John the Baptist at the Jordan River marked the beginning of His earthly ministry, a ministry of costly service and love, which will lead to His passion, death, and resurrection. Jesus' baptism also symbolized His unity with lost humankind, His solidarity with sinners, the outcast, oppressed, exploited and the most vulnerable in society, and His complete surrender to His Father's will. Jesus' identification with sinners is met with God's public declaration that Jesus is His beloved Son as the Spirit of God descended upon Him.

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"In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased'" (Mark: 1:9-11 NRSV).

The Gospel of Mark, Chapter 10:38 states, "But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?"" Here, Jesus uses the mental picture of baptism to relate the life of His disciples to His mission of self-giving love. Thus, the event of baptism is a visible sign of the commencement of the Christian journey in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Baptism signifies a person's death to the old way of life and a rebirth to a life in Christ. They become partakers of the life and love to the Triune in whose name they were baptized.

Drifting From Our Moorings

hen I attended Communicants' Classes half-acentury ago, the late Rev. E. T. Sieunarine informed us that the name of our church is based on the Greek word "Presbuteros", commonly translated as "Elder": thus, we are the Church of the Elders. This was reinforced at the First Presbyterian Church in Norman, Oklahoma, where I worshipped while a student. In that Church, Ministers were seldom referred to as Ordained Ministers. instead, they were referred to as Teaching Elders.

Two events over the past several years have led me to wonder whether we, as a church, are reconsidering the unique position of Elders in the PCTT. This article describes those two events and invites discussion on this subject.

The first incident involved a group of Ministers and church members chatting informally after a meeting. One of the members was commenting on a task we had undertaken together, and in doing so he referred to me as a "Church Worker". The, then Moderator, who was in easy earshot, interrupted him to sternly state that, "Presiding Elders are **NOT** Church workers." Now, we all recognized that Presiding Eldership is a voluntary order, and so our position is financially different from Ordained Ministers and Deaconesses. But the vehemence with which the words were spoken conveyed a deeper meaning - that Presiding Elders occupy a lower rung in the Church hierarchy.

The second incident pertains to a change to our Constitution. In the earlier version of the Constitution, Chapter V, Clause 5, clearly states that upon election and completion of training at St. Andrew's Theological College, an Elder is to be ordained to the Eldership and inducted as an Elder of their respective congregation. The revised version of the Constitution contains very different wording. In Chapter V, Clause 14, it states that Elders are to be installed in office "by prayer and appropriate ceremony." Curiously, the title for

this Clause is "Arrangements for Ordination and Installation", but the clause itself is entirely silent on the question of ordination. I have not yet received a clear rationale why Elders will no longer be ordained in our Church.

One less-than-charitable explanation for these two events is simply that Elders are being "put in their place". Elders must be seen and must see themselves as less-important than Ministers and Deaconesses. If this is, in fact, the case, then it represents a significant departure from our Presbyterian heritage.

Sailors fully understand that a mooring is a point at which a boat or ship can be safely tied up before the passengers and crew disembark. A secure mooring keeps the vessel safe, even when there is no one on board. But if a vessel slips its mooring, it will either run aground or drift out to be lost at sea. We are in equal danger, as a church, when we drift from our Presbyterian moorings.

150 years is a long time, Susamachar is only one of six Presbyterian Churches which have attained this milestone. Happy Anniversary, Susamachar.

Lent: Say No to Self and Yes to Jesus Christ

Jesus said to them all, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Matthew 16:24).

esus told his disciples that the Christian life is a life of self- denial. This is one of the recurring themes of His teachings. Self-denial is defined as the willingness to deny oneself of possession or status in order to grow in a right relationship of holiness and commitment to God. When Jesus said, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself," he meant that this was the only way to follow him. A life of sacrifice and self-denial is for anyone who wants to be his disciple. The Apostle Paul described it this way, "But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:7). A great theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, stated, "When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die."

The Greek verb "to deny" (arneomai) means to forget our selfish nature entirely and reject anything that will get in the way of offering ourselves for God's service. As we respond to the call this Lenten season, Jesus Christ calls us to put to death our old sinful nature with all its selfish desires.

During this period of Lent we may apply different forms of discipline to prove our allegiance to Christ and his call. Most notably is fasting which causes us to sift or assess those things to which we are attracted or attached and decide as a demonstration of 'self denial' to abstain from or give them up in this holy season. Jesus calls us to deny ourselves so that we, too, may do the work that God has called us to do. It means saying no to those things that are not in keeping with God's will for us, at least at present. The Apostle Paul described his transformation in this manner, "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

Secondly, Jesus said, *"Take up your cross and follow me."* In the time of Jesus Christ, the cross represented nothing but torturous death. Criminals were forced to carry their own crosses to the place of crucifixion, bearing a cross meant carrying their own execution device while facing ridicule along the way to death. The disciples did not yet know this, but later the cross would become a symbol of life and salvation. Jesus declared to his own disciples that he himself will endure suffering, rejection and even death.


A decision to follow Jesus Christ also means a life of 'cross bearing' for us, his followers. The call to take up our cross is commonly understood to mean the acceptance of trials and tribulations which we face daily, however, in my opinion, it is more than a symbol of the difficulties experienced in this world. The point is that any person, whether a follower of Jesus or not. will suffer frustration and pain in this life because we live in a sinful world. Cross-bearing is something that goes deeper, beyond the ordinary trials of daily life. When Jesus challenges us to bear the cross, He implied that it must be part of our everyday experience. It is not a response we make only at

the beginning of our Christian walk, but throughout our lives in faith, it means laying ourselves on the altar of daily obedience. The implication is that even if obedience is painful and humiliating, we should be willing to endure it all to the very end. For most of us, there comes a point in our lives when we are faced with a choice: Jesus, or the comforts of this world, Christ, himself, made that choice for us all by taking up his own cross and making the ultimate sacrifice so that by his life, death, and resurrection we can have life and have it more abundantly. Mark 10:45 reminds us, "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." The call to deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow our Lord and Saviour. Jesus Christ, means commitment to the point of giving up our hopes, dreams, possessions, even if need be, the very life we have planned. When we are willing to sacrifice our time, energy, rights, position, reputation, privileges, comforts, and even our very lives for the sake of Christ, we exemplify what it means to take up our cross. By doing this, we are following the example of Christ who denied himself, took up his cross and followed the will of the Father.

In Luke 22: 42-43, Jesus prayed, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done." An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him.'

John 3:16. reminds us of the ultimate sacrifice which he made on the cross for us all, *"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."*

BRAIDED EASTER EGG BREAD

INGREDIENTS

1 tbsp active dry yeast 1 cup warm water 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup warm milk 4 eggs 1 stick butter 1 1/2 salt 1 tsp cinnamon 7 cups flour to 9 cups flour

METHOD

Dissolve yeast in water. Stir in sugar and add 1/2 cup flour and let sit for 10 mins. Add the milk. eggs, butter, salt, and cinnamon. Stir in the 4 cups of flour and add more flour until the dough rolls in a smooth ball. Put dough in a bowl and coat with butter and let rise for 1 to 2 hours. Divide the dough into 2 pieces. Divide the first piece into 3 even pieces. Braid the dough and shape in a circle. Repeat the second dough. Let the wreath rise for 30 mins. Preheat oven to 350 F and put egg glaze on dough and bake for 30 mins.

VEG & SHRIMP TEMPURA INGREDIENTS

¹/₂ cup cauliflower ((prepared in florets) 1 cup cleaned shrimps 10 ozs diced broccoli in florets 1 cup button mushrooms Oil for frying Soy sauce and sesame oil to serve

> BATTER 1 cup flour 2 tbsp oil 2 eggs, 34 cup water Salt and seasoning

METHOD

Pre-prepared veg and shrimps For the batter, place the flour and salt in bowl. Blend the egg, seasoning, water, and flour and form a smooth batter. Coat the veg and shrimp with the batter

Fry the items until golden brown Put on platter and serve with sauces

METHOD

Heat the oil, sauté the onion, carrot, tomatoes, and green pepper

For the batter: mix the water, baking powder, flour, salt and pepper

Coat the fish and fry

Place the fried fish in a dish and pour the sauce over it.

INGREDIENTS 1 cup pineapple tidbits (drained) 4 cups cooked rice, preferably one day old 4 tbsp oil for stir fry 2 shallots 3 cloves of garlic ¹/₂ cup roasted cashews ¹/₂ cup frozen peas 1 egg beaten ¹/₄ cup raisins 1 tbsp sesame oil 3 tbsp chicken stock ¹/₂ tbsp soy sauce

2 tsp curry powder1 tsp sugar3 spring onions finely sliced1 cup diced shrimps semi cooked (optional)

METHOD

Put oil in pot add oil, shallots, garlic and shrimps. Then add the prepared cut up scrambled eggs and mix well. Add cashews and frozen peas. Add the seasoned rice (chopped celery and sweet peppers). Stir fry rice with chicken stock, sesame oil and soy sauce. Garnish with pineapple, nuts and celery.

he Archive is located on 'Paradise Hill' San Fernando. Here resides the Offices of the Synod of the PCTT with its Secretariat, the offices of the Moderator, the General Secretary, the General Treasurer and the Communications Manager. he students of the Charlieville Presbyterian Primary School hosted its annual Easter Bonnet Parade but this year, because of protocol restrictions, we utilized the facilities that technology offers to pre-record the celebration. Our first Virtual Easter Bonnet Parade was aired on Friday 1st April 2022 on YouTube as the principal, Mrs. Dianne Phillip-Ramjattan, formally closed the January-April 2022 Academic Term for her staff and students. Mr. Alister Ramrattan, the teacher of Standard One, enthusiastically hosted online.

When we think about Easter, we reverence in humility the sacrifice of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, who paid for our mortal sins. In fact we would have just finished engaged in Lenten Worship that focussed on the significance and symbolism of the most important liturgical season to Christianity. However, the images change from the cross, nails, blood, the crown of thorns and the torn garments to the rolled stone, empty tomb, white lilies, blinding lights, the women visiting, the angel reminding of Jesus' promises, the joy of a Living Lord. Easter signifies the resurrection of our Lord.

sometimes symbolized with the headpiece dubbed the Easter Bonnet. Wearing new clothes—or restoring old ones—at Easter, which is celebrated in the Spring time, is an old custom that has been practiced for generations. Spring sparks the celebration of renewal and rebirth for people who live on the earth's Temperate climates, as well as a pretence for some new finery. It mirrors the Easter story: as nature would have perished during the cold months – a resurrection of life is evident in the change of season to Spring. In the Christian calendar, Easter signals the end of Lent, so we indulge in a little millinery extravagance.

The wearing of Easter Bonnets became a tradition, it is even documented in Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, which mentioned it as Mercutio chides Benvolio: "Did'st thou not fall out with a Tailor for wearing his new Doublet before Easter?" But it was a song written by Irving Berlin in the 1930s that ingrained the notion of wearing a new hat for the Easter Parade into the popular culture psyche. The elaborate hats (which often matched a special dress) were worn to church and then to the Easter Parade which began in New York,







USA in 1870.

An Easter bonnet can be dramatic or whimsical, unusual, or inventive, is typically wide brimmed with a pastel satin ribbon and springtime motifs such as flowers. This was evident in the displays of the children at Charlieville. Even the decor of the event was skillfully designed by their teachers: Mrs. Andromeda Phillips, Mrs. Carol Nandlal-Seejore, Mr. Alister Ramrattan, and Mrs. Sheena Ramoutar. Mrs. Allyson Rampersad and Mrs Sally Seepaul awa token baskets filled with goodies and stationery to all participants.


